### **COMMANDER'S COMMENTS**

### What's in a Name?

There's been a lot of discussion, to say nothing of cussin', about the Order's name and whether it should be changed. And what it should be changed to. I suspect we all have an opinion on both questions.

Should we change our name? On one hand, the Order's current name recognizes and emphasizes our heritage – MOWW is a child of the Great War and of World War 2. At the same time, though, the name suggests to those who don't know us that we are a backward looking outfit, focused entirely on the past. It also suggests that all the post WW2 conflicts the U. S. has been involved in – Korea, Vietnam, Iraq, Afghanistan – are less important and not worthy of recognition or remembrance. We all know that that's not so, but the sad truth is that, rightly or wrongly, we're judged by our name, and people tend to see us as military fossils – if they see us at all. Personally, I think it's a foregone conclusion that the Order WILL change its name and will do it at the next National Convention. That notwithstanding, what do you think? Change, yes or no, and why?

Assuming the decision is made to change the Order's name, what would you suggest? I tend to favor something simple – like ditching the full name and becoming MOWW, similar to what many corporations have done in the past: IBM, P&G, and the like. Or, perhaps, something a bit more traditional, say something like Military Order of America's Wars. Something whimsical or something forward looking. What would you suggest?

This branding becomes important, I think, when National embarks on a publicity campaign. One of the Order's major problems is that virtually nobody knows we exist, much less what we do. We've traditionally shunned the limelight, preferring to keep a low profile and doing what we do quietly and without major fanfare. That was good for a while, but the hard lesson from that practice is that if people don't know we exist they won't join. We need that public exposure outside our home communities. Chapters can only do so much in terms of publicity; we need a national publicity plan and a new name to get the public's attention.

Once again, I invite you to send your ideas to me or any of the Chapter officers. All will be considered and forwarded to the new Name Change Committee being formed at National.

Times and technologies have changed but home security has not really gotten much better. Yes, we have CCTV cameras in our door bells and around the house; but you are probably not the only one viewing those live feeds. Social media and poor "social security" habits give a wide number of folks too much information about what we're doing and where we're going.

Safe travel tips to protect your empty home while you're gone:

- 1. Don't talk about your trip to visit the grandkids on social media...and remind the grandkids not to talk about your trip.
- 2. Don't post your Christmas pictures until you've returned from your visit.

### **HISTORY NOTE 2**

The MOWW proceeded to organize after its appearance in 1919. It was a slow process with many obstacles. Notably, the organization and others like it suffered through the pain of the Great Depression. Most people were concerned about where they were going to find a paying job, support families, and put food on the table. The pre-World War II years found the country divided, with many isolationist organizations opposing entry into World War II. And the World War II years were given over to fighting the war.

It wasn't until after the war ended that the Order began to gain members and pick up speed. In El Paso, there was no chapter of the Order until 1960, when several retired officers started a chapter. In a letter to LTC Odis Paul Lance dated March 23, 1960, the commander of Region VIII of the MOWW, Col. Robert E. Joseph (Retired), invite Lance to join the new chapter. Col Joseph said that the El Paso chapter would receive its charter on Saturday, March 26, 1960, at a luncheon in the Fort Bliss Officers' Mess at 1 PM. The letter was typed on the letterhead stationery of the United Services Automobile Association, where Col. Joseph worked. Joseph sent LTC Lance a packet of materials, including information about the order, its purposes and objectives, and an application for membership. Apparently, LTC Lance was not yet a member. Membership dues for one year were \$4.

The Chapter commander-elect was COL (R) Arthur Solem, and the adjutant-elect was LTC Michael Halliday. Both were prominent in the El Paso military retirement community. COL Solem was a West Point graduate, class of 1927. An artillery officer, he had retired on Fort Bliss 1957, where he had served as the deputy director of the Special Weapons Development Office. This was a euphemism for nuclear weapons development. Also, the artillery and air defense artillery were the same branch, having consolidated in 1947. After retirement Solem became the director of research in the Office of Human Resources on the post, a civilian slot. Solem was well-known on Fort Bliss and in the El Paso community. He organized and was the first president of the Fort Bliss Golf Association. Along with GEN William P. Ennis, Jr., he organized the El Paso Area West Point Association. He was also the president of the Del Norte Polo Association. Solem had been a cavalry officer with the 1st Cavalry Division on Fort Bliss in 1941. He was the local president of the 1st Cavalry Division Association chapter and oversaw the association's reunion in El Paso in 1958. One wonders how he found the time to do all he did.

The first roster of members of the El Paso Chapter is notable for the names that appear. Most prominent of its membership in 1962 was retired MG Terry de la Mesa Allen, who had commanded the 1st and the 104th Infantry Divisions in World War II. COL John Ballantyne was also a member, having served in World War II in the Pacific Theater. His son became a lieutenant general. BG E. W. Heathcote was the deputy commander of Fort Bliss. LTC Lance ran an engineering company in El Paso, handling major water and road projects. His business records are part of the archives of the El Paso County Historical Society. And COL Matthew H.

Thomlinson had been called back to active duty in World War II to command the garrison at Fort Bliss. He authored the book, *The Garrison of Fort Bliss, 1849-1916*, published by Hertzog & Resler in El Paso in 1945.

We'll write more about some of these early members of the chapter in a later issue of the newsletter.
