COMMANDER'S REPORT:

Welcome back everybody. Hope your summer was restful and pleasant. As we all get back to preparing for the current operating year's activities, I want to take a moment to thank all those fellow companions, associates and partner organizations who contributed to our previous operational year successes. The results from our recent annual national convention are in and our chapter (as did our Region) faired quite well this year. Region XIII received top honors through its chapter performances and even took home recognition for having the most attendee fellow companions in attendance. Our very own Chapter brought home the lion's share of national awards, placing within the top three award winners in seven competition categories. One of the most notable was "Chapter of the Year" in the medium chapter category, its first time out competing within a field of eight total chapter competitors. Find out more in this edition on the Chapter-in-Action segment. Our very own Chapter Adjutant was also re-elected for a third term as national vice commander-in-chief of the Order overseeing our region once again and Region VII which covers five gulf coast states in the southeast. Congrats to all!

TREASURER'S REPORT:

As of the writing of the chapter financial treasurer report, our CHASE Bank Chapter Bank account balance is; Checking - \$1,206.70 dollars and Savings - \$5,410.26 dollars respectively. As already reported previously, our chapter sponsored 13 student delegates at \$549.00 per student cost for a total payment to AZYL, Inc. of \$7,137.00 dollars with no further outstanding expenses pending. Extracting the AZYL, Inc. payout to the initial \$12,196.48 dollars donation from the former Catalina Mountains Chapter leaves a remaining balance of \$5,059.48 dollars to be transferred into the newly created US Bank AZYLC Fund account, once our chapter has provided the signature information requested. Once the transfer has been completed our CHASE Bank account Savings will have a balance of \$350.78 dollars in funds starting its operations for the current year. Forthcoming anticipated chapter expenditures for the first quarter are anticipated to require about\$1,500.00 dollars (to meet initial administrative and operational & management demands). The annual Country Fair White Elephant Grant Committee request letter has already been submitted. We are requesting \$3,500.00 dollars in grant support, an increase from last year of \$1,500.00 dollars.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

Hi all. My Adjutant's report will mostly cover my MOWW national convention after-action notes and some coordination items on our first quarter chapter operations "to do" list. Our commander already briefed our strong showing at the national convention awards competition this year, so I'll proceed with the stated MOWW key focus areas for the current operating year. With the approval of the MOWW Strategic Plan 20-23-2028 all priorities at the national and field operational levels of community service will highlight "outreach and partnership building." All other stated strategic goals are considered enablers to this central local area engagement area of the MOWW mission. National leadership recommends all companions go to the national website at www.MOWW.org and review the CINC's intent letter, review the actual MOWW Strategic Goal 2023-2028 posted publication, and reflect this significant shift in organizational strategic planning into its annual Chapter Action Plan. Some projects currently in the early planning stages for this year include; 1) building and testing an online MOWW proxy voting system, 2) lobbying the general staff to seriously consider expanding future CINC tour of duty to a two -year commitment, 3) the development and installation of an HQ-based IRS 501c3 counterpart body along side our current IRS 501c19 nonprofit operational structure, and 4) reaching final Ad Hoc committee recommendations to the Executive Committee on membership policy reform and organization re-branding/re-naming recommendations no later than March of 2024. Our Chapter recruitment goal for this year (to obtain our desired 4% Chapter chapter growth 4% increase is the recruitment of 3 new fellow companions who all must be retired, former or current active duty military. Our Chapter personal recruitment goal for this year (to help reduce our current 72.1% IRS 75% vs 25%shortfall) is the recruitment of 4 new fellow chapter companions who are all retired, former or current military commissioned or warrant officers. MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

Upon Leaving Weather Forecaster School

Having graduated from the toughest then known meteorology school was a big deal and getting back to weather work at Westover Field, Massachusetts, on my first assignment as an Air Force weather forecaster was just as big — forecasting for the Berlin Airlift. But first, Marie and I, with baby daughter Leta (in photo below with 1939 Lincoln), would drive back and visit our families. New cars had not been produced in WWII. This was 1948 and they still were unavailable. I bought a used 1939 Lincoln Zephyr, a nice-looking car with 12 cylinders and we drove away from Rantoul, Illinois.



All was going well until in Peru, Indiana, the car threw a connecting rod. It was the Fourth of July weekend. No mechanic could be found so we bussed to Marie's mother's farm at Hastings, Michigan. Marie's parents, Martha and Walt, had arranged to meet us there. Walt, my WWI veteran father-in-law, drove his '40 DeSoto, taking me and his brother-in-law, Marie's Uncle John, to tow the car to Michigan. While we towed, I enjoyed talking with Uncle John. He had been a farmer all his life. His very livelihood depended upon knowing much about weather. He said he sometimes knew it was going to rain when he saw a certain cloud. He tried to describe it, but I couldn't relate his description to anything in the international classification of clouds. After a visit with relatives in Hastings, my in-laws drove us to their home in a Detroit suburb, close to my parents' home in the city itself. Dad was about to drive to the family farm ion Caro, Mi that he left in WWII to produce B-29 engine parts in Detroit. He was going to replace shingles on the old farmhouse. I asked to help. Just as we started to nail shingles on the steeply sloping farmhouse roof, Dad asked the obvious: "Theodore, will it rain before we finish."

I wanted to impress my father with what I now knew as a weather forecaster graduate, but the only data I had were the wind and, from our great vantage point up there on the roof, a spectacular view of the sky. The wind was from the southwest. Stretching to examine the southwest horizon while being careful to not raise my center of gravity to a roofslipping point, in the far southwest, past our creek and the popple woods on the farm's back 20, I saw a narrow line of clouds with aligned turrets, the cloud formation known as altocumulus castellatus, literally castles in the air, which weather professionals abbreviated acc. Way back in weather observer school we were told acc was indicative of a highly unstable mid-level atmosphere. If enough heating destabilized the ground-based layer, thunderstorms were possible. So, I went out on a climb. Pointing at that spectacular cloud line I said, "Those clouds are predictors of thunderstorms that could develop this afternoon." Of course, I knew it was unprofessional to make such a statement without the vast amount of data available to forecasters that weather observers produced and transmitted to other stations in real time.



In my future, I would be more careful, but this time I just wanted to impress Dad. In mid-afternoon, thunder cracked overhead. A vigorous downpour raced us as we scrambled down a ladder to throw our tools into the trunk of Dad's '40 Ford. On the drive back to the family home in heavy rain, I wondered if the cloud Uncle John had tried to describe was acc, the castles in the air. And a glance at Dad told me I could detect in him an admiring and yet puzzling look. It was as if he were saying to himself: "Could that boy really be a weather forecaster?" *Note: The cloud in photo of hurricane-hunting WB-50 above is similar to but does not have acc's pronounced turrets.*

AUGUST IN HISTORY

August 1

August 1, 1838 - Slavery was abolished in Jamaica. It had been introduced by Spanish settlers 300 years earlier in 1509.

August 1, 1944 - Anne Frank penned her last entry into her diary. "[I] keep on trying to find a way of becoming what I would like to be, and what I could be, if...there weren't any other people living in the world." Three days later, Anne and her family were arrested and sent to Nazi concentration camps. Anne died at Bergen-Belsen concentration camp on March 15, 1945, at age 15.

August 1, 1944 - The Warsaw Uprising began as the Polish Home Army, numbering about 40,000 Polish patriots, began shooting at German troops in the streets. The Nazis then sent eight divisions to battle the Poles, who had hoped for, but did not receive, assistance from the Allies. Two months later, the rebellion was quashed.

Birthday - *Star-Spangled Banner* author Francis Scott Key (1779-1843) was born in Frederick County, Maryland. After witnessing the British bombardment of Fort McHenry on the night of September 13-14, 1814, he was enthralled to see the American flag still flying over the fort at daybreak. He then wrote the <u>poem</u> originally entitled *Defense of Fort McHenry* which became the U.S. National Anthem in 1931.

Birthday - Moby Dick author Herman Melville (1819-1891) was born in New York.

August 2

August 2, 1776 - In Philadelphia, most of the 55 members of the Continental Congress signed the parchment copy of the <u>Declaration of Independence</u>.

August 2, 1923 - President Warren G. Harding died suddenly in a hotel in San Francisco while on a Western speaking tour. His administration had been tainted by the Teapot Dome political scandal and his sudden death prompted many unfounded rumors. He was succeeded the next day by <u>Calvin Coolidge</u>.

August 2, 1939 - Albert Einstein wrote a <u>letter to President Franklin D. Roosevelt</u> concerning the possibility of atomic weapons. "A single bomb of this type carried by boat and exploded in a port, might very well destroy the whole port together with some of the surrounding territory." Six years later, on August 6, 1945, the first Atomic Bomb, developed by the U.S., was dropped on the Japanese port of Hiroshima.

August 2, 1990 - The Iraqi army invaded Kuwait amid claims that Kuwait threatened Iraq's economic existence by overproducing oil and driving prices down on the world market. An Iraqi military government was then installed in Kuwait which was annexed by Iraq on the claim that Kuwait was historically part of Iraq. This resulted in Desert Shield, the massive Allied military buildup, and later the 100-hour war against Iraq, Desert Storm.

August 3

August 3, 1492 - Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain, with three ships, *Nina*, *Pinta* and *Santa Maria*. Seeking a westerly route to the Far East, he instead landed on October 12th in the Bahamas, thinking it was an outlying Japanese island.

Birthday - War correspondent Ernie Pyle (1900-1945) was born in Dana, Indiana. His syndicated column offered sympathetic insights into the experiences of common soldiers during World War II. He received a Pulitzer Prize for his reports of the bombing of London in 1940 and later war reports from Africa, Sicily, Italy and France. He was killed by machine-gun fire near Okinawa in the South Pacific on April 18, 1945.

Birthday - Gray Panthers founder Maggie Kuhn (1905-1995) was born in Buffalo, New York. After she was forced into mandatory retirement at age 65, she founded the Gray Panthers organization to fight age discrimination and succeeded in the banning of mandatory retirement in most professions.

Father of three sons Frances, Victor, and Cristina, and grandfather of six grandsons Julian, Emma, Sofia, Adrian, Daniel, and Noah.
