COMMANDER'S REPORT:

Hello to everyone and salutations from Rio Rico, Arizona. While my duties with the Rio Rico Unified School District is already transitioning to the summer recess and summer school mode, the same is definitely not the case with our local Santa Cruz Valley Chapter 193 community support service operations. We are now in the "home stretch" as they say and hope to close as strong (if not stronger) than we started last 1 JULY 2022. This year's ROTC-JROTC Awards Support Program was challenging, as we were faced with servicing new added schools to our chapter operations while trying to preserve our stellar support operations with our partners in neighboring Utah. I wish to share my deepest gratitude to all those this year who helped out with medal package distribution and presentations at the various schools. As you will all read in this month's Chapter Newsletter "Chapter-in-Action" segment we were able to not only meet those challenges but also surpass our usual stellar service performance, having handed out an impressive 44 JROTC medals between 8 Arizona and 7 Utah high schools, and 3 ROTC medals at the University of Arizona and 1 ROTC medal at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City. WE also want to welcome our three newest SCV Chapter fellow companions; LTC (RET) Jeffrey Coberly, USA, CWO5 (RET) Karl (Scott) McKenzie, USA, and Lt Col (RET) Denise L. Harris, USAF. While Jeff and Denise have been added to out Chapter Satellite operations in Utah, Scott will be helping us locally in southern Arizona. We now turn our sights upon securing and submitting our AZYLC 2023 summer program commitment of a total of 12 student delegates. WE should have all the applications for review by the end of this coming week or by 15 MAY (which ever comes first). As the end of the current operating year gets closer, I would like to share my personal thanks to one and all for a great first year as your commander, and I look forward to serving as your chapter commander once again for the upcoming 2023-2024 operating year.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

As of the writing of this status report, our Chapter CHASE BANK account shows the following balance amounts, checking \$547.96 USDs and savings \$12,746.96 USDs. As anticipated, with the added replenishment of our Chapter Awards Support Program outreach and support services supply inventory needs. All available medal and other materials had to be replenished to meet the increased demands (in addition to the added USPS mailing/shipping cost associated with servicing out of state ROTC and JROTC program requests). The only "still outstanding" chapter financial business to be tended to before we close out the current 2022-2023 operating year is the establishing the SCV Chapter AZYLC Fund account and the pending transfer of funds earmarked for this purpose before the end of JUNE 2023. In summary, our chapter has performed well and managed to conduct all of its stated operational goals within the confines of our "small chapter" budgetary constraints.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

We are now entering the most critical quarter of every operating year (OY) - that of successfully submitting all required "end-of-OY" reports and national awards package submissions. As has been the case in previous years, our chapter has once again qualified to submit for the coveted General of the Armies (GAS) John J. Pershing Chapter of the Year National Award. While the chapter is to be commended for all the great community support outreach efforts, historical operational milestones, and outstanding chapter recruitment performance, it all falls by the waste-side if we fail to file all the required documentation and comply with the numerous OY "closeout" administrative reporting requirements by the allotted suspense period of 1 JUNE 2023, which is a mere 24 days away as of the writing of this newsletter status report entry. We have diligently collected all the data we need to compile and complete the required reports, so we ask for your patience and cooperation should we ask anyone for added information during the report completion process. Also keep in mind that some of our chapter fellow companions are also serving in other MOWW national capacities, so their availability to assist our chapter administrative and managerial needs may not be possible at times. Regardless, we will meet all deadlines, as time and workload may permit. I also want to take this opportunity to remind everyone that we still have two scheduled chapter meetings before we end the current OY. Our SCV Chapter 193 (QTR-4 - ZOOM ONLY Video Conference Call (VCC) staff meetings will be on the fourth Saturday of this month (SAT, 27 MAY @ 11AM - virtual online) and our last SCV Chapter 193 (AM-4: HYBRID/face to face/locale) general membership meeting is scheduled for the first Saturday of next month (SAT, 3 JUNE @ 11:30AM – Casa Del Rio Mexican Restaurant in east Tucson). I would also like to extend my sincerest thanks to everyone who has helped this year to place our chapter at its strongest national awards contender submission position ever this year. 



The most resent ceremony provided an official military burial with full military honors to 19 fellow deceased veterans.

Our Chapter had another very successful ROTC-JROTC Awards Support Services Program (ASSP)season, in APR and MAY of the current 2022-2023 operating year. In all 17 academic institution ROTC and JROTC programs in southern Arizona and throughout the neighboring state of Utah were serviced (presenting or mailing out a total of 44 JROTC and 4 ROTC medal packages (27 JROTC / 3 ROTC in southern Arizona, and 17 JROTC / 1 ROTC in the state of Utah). MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

Weather Observer School

In the spring of 1946, I was selected for Weather Observer School at Chanute Field, Illinois.ng. The German army had surrendered In the European Theater of Operations, and General Eisenhower returned to Washington to be Army Chief of Staff. In the Pacific Theater, in Tokyo Bay the Japanese had surrendered to General MacArthur aboard the battleship Missouri, and here in the American Theater there was no longer much concern about enemy submarines lurking offshore. But because there were isolated holdouts in the Pacific islands, uncertainty in the Balkans, and intentions of the Soviet Union unknown, World War Two was officially ongoing.

The students at Weather Observer School were a mixture of enlistees and draftees with a year or less service. Among the enlistees, one might be an 18-monther, the shortest enlistment choice, or a three-year termer who thought military service might extend into career length, and a few who had committed to a sort of compromise, a twoyear term. I was a three-year enlistee. If you chose three years you had your choice of overseas theater and Army branch. I chose the European theater and the Army Air Corps. The Army Air Corps was then the most technical branch so I wanted to avoid being sent to the ground combat arms, the Infantry and artillery. As the Scottish poet Robert Burns famously said, things don't turn out in ways planned. "The best laid plans o' mice an' men gang oft agley." I was never sent to the European Theater and after 16 active and two Ready Reserve years in the Air Corps and USAF, I would be in the Army artillery, all those years in weather work though in varied meteorological specialties.

Some of us came from the Midwest, close enough to make it home over weekends. Others went sightseeing over Saturday and Sunday. It was then perfectly safe to hitchhike. Because wearing civilian clothes was not then allowed and a man in uniform found it easy to get rides, I often hitchhiked home. On Monday mornings,



tired from the trip, instructor's loud- speaker voice made it difficult stay awake. If student began to nod off, a corporal carrying s h i n y swagger stick proudly patrolled the desk rows and gently tapped that desk with the stick. I had been lucky in not

being so embarrassed until one Monday morning after a tiring hitch-hiking trip, 300 miles home to Michigan and back, I tried everything I could think of to stay awake but just when I could no longer fight it, while I sat there conspicuously sound asleep, his stick smashed loudly onto my desk. That did alert me, and he then stepped a few rows back, watching, no doubt thinking of making a more forceful response at the next violation. He really didn't need to keep an eye on me. I stayed awake, not wanting to see him cry should his prized swagger stick crash itself into toothpicks at my desk.



We welcome fellow Santa Cruz Valley Chapter - 193 companion CWO (RET) Theodore L. "Ted" Cogut, USA to our monthly newsletter writing staff contributor team for the new year. Ted transferred his chapter membership affiliation over to our chapter from the former Catalina Mountains Chapter which operated out of east Tucson until this past June 2022 when they ceased operations. MAY IN HISTORY

May 1

May 1st - Observed as May Day, a holiday and spring festival since ancient times, also observed in socialist countries as a workers' holiday or Labor Day.

May 1, 1707 - Great Britain was formed from a union between England and Scotland. The union included Wales which had already been part of England since the 1500's. The United Kingdom today consists of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

May 1, 1960 - An American U-2 spy plane flying at 60,000 feet was shot down over Sverdlovsk in central Russia on the eve of a summit meeting between President <u>Dwight D. Eisenhower</u> and Soviet Russia's Premier Nikita Khrushchev. The sensational incident caused a cancellation of the meeting and heightened existing Cold War tensions. The pilot, CIA agent Francis Gary Powers, survived the crash, and was tried, convicted and sentenced to 10 years in prison by a Russian court. Two years later he was released to America in exchange for an imprisoned Soviet spy. On his return to America, Powers encountered a hostile public which apparently believed he should not have allowed himself to be captured alive. He died in a helicopter crash in 1977.

May 1, 2004 - Eight former Communist nations and two Mediterranean countries joined the European Union (EU) marking its largest-ever expansion. The new members included Poland, Hungary, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Slovenia, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, along with the island of Malta and the Greek portion of the island of Cyprus. They joined 15 countries already in the EU, representing in all 450 million persons.

Birthday - Irish-born American labor leader Mary 'Mother' Jones (1830-1930) was born in County Cork, Ireland. She endured misfortune early in life as her husband and four children died in the yellow fever epidemic of 1867. She also lost all of her belongings in the Chicago Fire of 1871. She then devoted herself to organizing and advancing the cause of Labor, using the slogan, "Join the Union, boys." She also sought to prohibit child labor. She remained active until the very end, giving her last speech on her 100th birthday.

Birthday - World War II General Mark Clark (1896-1984) was born in Madison Barracks, New York. He commanded the U.S. Fifth Army which <u>invaded Italy</u> in September of 1943, fighting a long and brutal campaign against stubborn German opposition.

Birthday - African American Olympic athlete Archie Williams (1915-1993) was born in Oakland, California. Williams, along with Jesse Owens, defeated German athletes at the 1936 Berlin Olympics and helped debunk Adolf Hitler's theory of Aryan racial superiority. Williams won a gold medal in the 400-meter race. After the Olympics, he went on to earn a mechanical engineering degree from the University of California-Berkeley but faced discrimination and wound up digging ditches. He later became an airplane pilot and trained Tuskegee Institute pilots including the black air corp of World War II.

May 2

May 2, 2011 - U.S. Special Operations Forces killed Osama bin Laden during a raid on his secret compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan. The raid marked the culmination of a decade-long manhunt for the elusive leader of the al-Qaeda terrorist organization based in the Middle East. Bin Laden had ordered the coordinated aerial attacks of September 11th, 2001, in which four American passenger jets were hijacked then crashed, killing nearly 3,000 persons. Two jets had struck and subsequently collapsed the 110-story Twin Towers of the World Trade Center in New York, while another struck the Pentagon building in Washington, D.C. A fourth jet also headed toward Washington had crashed into a field in Pennsylvania as passengers attempted to overpower the hijackers on board.

Birthday - Pope Leo XIII (1810-1903) was born in Carpino, Italy (as Gioacchino Pecci). He was elected Pope in 1878 at age 67 and lived to govern the church another 25 years, laying the foundation for modernization of Church attitudes toward a rapidly industrializing and changing world.
