COMMANDER'S REPORT:

Greetings to everyone. As we enter March, we also kick off our annual Region XIII ROTC-JROTC Awards Support Program (R-13 ASP) operations – where we begin receiving requests for both prior year returning school clients and newcomer school operations added to our growing support roster. This year we hope to equal (if not surpass) last year's support services to all those schools preparing to recognize their top performance ROTC and JROTC program cadets. Our chapter has a great awards support program track record - increasing its clientele every year, as the word gets out from satisfied school customers to their ROTC and JROTC program peers. Let's all give it our best effort this year to deliver a much well deserved MOWW Award of Merit support effort by signing up to serve as award presenters at schools in your local community and to also support those who will be sorting and preparing award packages to be mailed out to all those out-of-state programs we support.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Hello, everyone. As of the writing of this Treasurer report, our chapter finds itself doing well financially, even as this time of year we typically spend whatever remains of our operating year funding in meeting our growing R-13 ASP ROTC-JROTC awards support request demands. We are currently engaged in supporting both traditional local southern Arizona ROTC and JROTC school programs and also have been picking up added request from out-of-state schools in Utah and New Mexico as well. As a consequence our available remaining funds and account balance usually reflects a steady depletion trend (due to continuous award medal, citations, certificates, and folder supplies being in high demand to fulfill all our requested award presentation event commitments. This leads me to remind all companions that chapter fundraising continues year-round and to consider doing our part to help replenish some of the partial Patriotic Education funding (as may be needed) to at least keep us operating through the end of June. That shared, we are not quite there yet and we do have some funding to at least get us through this year's ROTC and JROTC awards presentation event season. Should that trend change, then we will re-evaluate our funding situation, as we transition to the next operating year cycle on 1 July of this year.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

Hi everyone, as our Chapter Commander highlighted, we are now into our yearly ROTC-JROTC awards support season. I would like to add that although the busiest chapter engagement season, it is also a great time to prepare, identify, and increase our annual end-of-operating year recruitment efforts. Last year we were able to recruit an additional 6 new chapter companions because of our proactive ROTC-JROTC awards support and event attendance engagement opportunities and recruitment acumen follow through. All those joining our chapter operations last year have enhanced this year's recruiting possibilities and they have all been asked to identify and signup all of their local program senior NCOs (E-7 through E-9) as new MOWW Chapter Sponsored Companions who can serve as MOWW representatives at their own schools and act as MOWW award proxy presenter, where due to their distant geographical area location, it makes MOWW award presenter participation and attending these far off events not feasible. As I address this topic, the MOWW Chapter Sponsorship Application Worksheet PDF "online fillable forms" are beginning to arrive on my desk for further MOWW HQ sponsored membership processing. Most new chapter companions (from this single sourcing effort alone) will further expand our very successful Chapter Expeditionary Outreach Program efforts in areas where no MOWW Cadre nor Chapter currently exist. 





MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

I Leave Selfridge Field, Michigan

In January 1951, my father-in-law took Marie and I in his 1940 DeSoto to the Michigan Central Station in Detroit, 33 miles from our home near Selfridge Field, Michigan where I would begin the first leg of the trip to Saudi Arabia, a one-year assignment. At that time, military on change of station went by train. I had briefed Marie on the intricacies of the oil-fired furnace I had installed in the new utility room, a part of the house extension made by my dad and my father-in-law with the help of brother Joe and brother-in-law Bob Nordstrom, all of them volunteers in the house enlargement project done while I was away at the High Altitude Forecasting School. They were sterling examples of the help military members needed from their families. As a last minute thought, I reminded Marie: "Don't forget to have the oil changed in the car every 1,000 miles." That was the norm for cars at that time, and it would be the source of much family laughter in subsequent years. It then made me think of how our lives were about to change. Marie would now have to take care of everything by herself. I would have a bunk in a

bunk in a Quonset hut. The station and train were crowded. As Marie and I tried to keep stiff-upper-lip goodbyes, a conductor guided me to a seat. The train would take me to Hartford, Connecticut, and from

there bus Westover Field, to Massachusetts, my well-remembered first military home. I was last assigned there in 1949, making over-the-Atlantic flight forecasts for heavily loaded C-54s carrying supplies for the Berlin Airlift. I will write about Saudi Arabia in subsequent articles, but now I jump far ahead and my return to our home near Selfridge Field, at the end of that Saudi Arabian tour. Upon that return, this was one of the first things Marie proudly said: "I handled everything okay, I changed the oil in the car every 500 miles!" That was our first nice car. I was then a staff sergeant and having money to buy it had been most difficult. Heart warmingly, I now laughed in relief. My military spouse, typically efficient, had made certain we would not have to search for the car's replacement money, at least for awhile. TLC

MARCH IN HISTORY

March 1

March 1, 1781 - Formal ratification of the <u>Articles of Confederation</u> was announced by Congress. Under the Articles, Congress was the sole governing body of the new American national government, consisting of the 13 original states. The Articles remained in effect through the <u>Revolutionary War</u> until 1789, when the current U.S. Constitution was adopted.

March 1, 1932 - The 20-month-old son of aviation pioneer Charles A. Lindbergh was kidnapped from his home in Hopewell, New Jersey. The Lindberghs then paid a \$50,000 ransom. However, on May 12, the boy's body was found in a wooded area a few miles from the house.

March 1, 1961 - President <u>John F. Kennedy</u> established the Peace Corps, an organization sending young American volunteers to developing countries to assist with health care, education and other basic human needs.

March 1, 1974 - Seven former high-ranking officials of the Nixon White House were indicted for conspiring to obstruct the investigation into the Watergate break-in. Among those indicted; former chief of staff H.R. Haldeman, former top aide John Ehrlichman, and former attorney general John Mitchell.

Birthday - American band leader Glenn Miller (1904-1944) was born in Carilinda, Iowa. His music gained enormous popularity during the 1940's through recordings such as *Moonlight Serenade* and *String of Pearls*. On December 15, 1944, his plane disappeared over the English Channel while en route to Paris where he was scheduled to perform.

March 2

March 2, 1943 - During World War II in the Pacific, a Japanese convoy was attacked by 137 American bombers as the Battle of Bismarck Sea began. The convoy included eight destroyers and eight transports carrying 7,000 Japanese soldiers heading toward New Guinea. Four destroyers and all eight transports were sunk, resulting in 3,500 Japanese drowned, ending Japanese efforts to send reinforcements to New Guinea.

Birthday - American soldier and politician <u>Sam Houston</u> (1793-1863) was born in Rockbridge County, Virginia. As a teenager he ran away and joined the Cherokee Indians who accepted him as a member of their tribe. He later served as a Congressman and Governor of Tennessee. In 1832, he became commander of the Texan army in the War for Texan Independence, defeating the larger Mexican army in 1836 at the Battle of San Jacinto. He then served as Senator and Governor of the new state of Texas but was removed in 1861 after refusing to swear allegiance to the Confederacy.

March 3


March 3, 1913 - A <u>women's suffrage march</u> in Washington D.C. was attacked by angry onlookers while police stood by. The march occurred the day before Woodrow Wilson's inauguration. Many of the 5,000 women participating were spat upon and struck in the face as a near riot ensued. Secretary of War Henry Stimson then ordered soldiers from Fort Myer to restore order.
