



MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

High Level Weather Charts

This was in 1949 at Selfridge Field, With no computers, no Michigan. orbiting satellites, and only rudimentary radars. Air Force weather forecasts came entirely from the brain of a lone forecaster at an air base. For flight-level winds, he referred to upper air charts that his weather observer had plotted and he himself drew for subsequent analysis. The plotted information came from a teletyped network of radiosondes flown at many U.S. and worldwide sites. As an example of the charts' use, if you then asked me the altitude a C-47 usually flew at, I might have said: "850" or "700," roughly the air pressure at 5,000- and 10,000 feet. Carrying the analogy to higher levels, 500 mbs of pressure roughly is at 20,000 feet and 300 mbs roughly 30,000 feet. With the jet aircraft then coming into operation, the 300 mb



pressure chart began to be frequently referred to. Our headquarters, Air Weather Service at Andrews Air Force Base, Maryland, directed there would be a test of 300 mb wind forecasting to be conducted at a chosen Air Force base. With its jet fighters, Selfridge was the base. Previously, having little need for that information, we forecasters didn't pay much attention to the 300 mb level. But with jet aircraft arrivals, we began to closely monitor that altitude. Our staff was composed of a captain, a first lieutenant, two warrant officers, and a buck sergeant (me). Individually, we would take the tests which consisted of 24-and 48-hour forecasts of the 300 mb wind. As the forecasts were made, they were sent to AWS. When I made the forecasts, I did have the advantage of having prepared many somewhathigh-altitude wind forecasts at the 17,000-foot level for the four-engine prop-driven C-54 Berlin Airlift flights. I used the techniques I had then developed. The other forecasters seemed to have discovered our comparative test results because I sensed admiring and perhaps unbelievable looks from them. Unbelievable because I was by far the youngest on the staff. The test continued for several weeks and at its end we learned a new weather course called Specialized High Altitude Forecasting Training was to be instituted at Chanute AFB, Illinois. Forecasters from all Air Force bases would eventually be sent to it. In a seminar-like atmosphere, it would be a gathering of forecasters who had done highlevel forecasting. They would pass on to the others their 300-mb procedures. One of our warrant officers was sent to its first class. I was sent to its second. TLC

JULY IN HISTORY

July 1

July 1st - Canada Day, a national holiday in Canada, formerly known as Dominion Day, commemorating the confederation of Upper and Lower Canada and some of the Maritime Provinces into the Dominion of Canada on July 1, 1867.

July 1, 1862 - President <u>Abraham Lincoln</u> signed the first income tax bill, levying a 3% income tax on annual incomes of \$600-\$10,000 and a 5% tax on incomes over \$10,000. Also on this day, the Bureau of Internal Revenue was established by an Act of Congress.

July 1, 1863 - Beginning of the Battle of Gettysburg during the American Civil War.

July 1, 1893 - President <u>Grover Cleveland</u> underwent secret cancer surgery aboard a yacht owned by his friend, Commodore E.C. Benedict. The surgery was performed on a cancerous growth in his mouth. The entire left side of his jaw was removed along with a small portion of his soft palate. A second, smaller operation was performed on July 17th. Cleveland was then fitted with a rubber prosthesis which he wore until his death in 1908. The secrecy was intended to prevent panic among the public during the economic depression of 1893.

July 2

July 2, 1776 - The Continental Congress in Philadelphia adopted the following resolution, originally introduced on June 7, by <u>Richard Henry Lee</u> of Virginia: "Resolved, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved. That it is expedient forthwith to take the most effectual measures for forming foreign Alliances. That a plan of confederation be prepared and transmitted to the respective Colonies for their consideration and approbation."

July 2, 1788 - Congress announced the <u>United States Constitution</u> had been ratified by the required nine states and that a committee had been appointed to make preparations for the new American government.

July 2, 1881 - President James A. Garfield was shot and mortally wounded as he entered a railway station in Washington, D.C. He died on September 19th.

July 2, 1917 - A race riot occurred in St. Louis, Missouri, resulting in an estimated 75 African Americans killed and hundreds injured. To protest the violence against blacks, <u>W.E.B. DuBois</u> and James Weldon Johnson later led a silent march down Fifth Avenue in New York.

July 2, 1964 - President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1964, prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race in public accommodations, publicly owned or operated facilities, employment and union membership and in voter registration. The Act allowed for cutoff of Federal funds in places where discrimination remained.

Birthday - The first African American on the U.S. Supreme Court, Thurgood Marshall (1908-1993) was born in Baltimore, Maryland. Nominated by President Johnson, he began his 24-year career on the High Court in 1967.

July 3

July 3, 1775 - During the American Revolution, George Washington took command of the Continental Army at Cambridge, Massachusetts.

July 3, 1976 - The raid on Entebbe airport in Uganda occurred as an Israeli commando unit rescued 103 hostages on a hijacked Air France airliner. The jet had been en route from Tel Aviv to Paris when it was hijacked by pro-Palestinian guerrillas. Three hostages, seven hijackers and twenty Ugandan soldiers were killed during the rescue.

July 3, 1988 - Iran Air Flight 655 was destroyed while flying over the Persian Gulf after the U.S. Navy Warship *Vincennes* fired two surface-toair missiles, killing all 290 passengers aboard. A subsequent U.S. military inquiry cited stress related human failure for the mistaken identification of the civilian airbus as an enemy F-14 fighter jet.

July 4

July 4, 1776 - The Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress.

July 4, 1863- <u>Vicksburg</u>, the last Confederate stronghold on the Mississippi River, surrendered to General Grant and the Army of the West after a six week siege. With the Union in control of the Mississippi, the Confederacy was effectively split in two, cut off from its western allies.

July 4, 1882 - The "Last Great Buffalo Hunt" began on Indian reservation lands near Hettinger, North Dakota as 2,000 Teton Sioux Indians in full hunting regalia killed about 5,000 buffalo. By this time, most of the estimated 60-75 million buffalo in America had been killed by white hunters who usually took the hides and left the meat to rot. By 1883, the last of the free-ranging buffalo were gone.

Birthday - Novelist and short-story writer <u>Nathaniel Hawthorne</u> (1804-1864) was born in Salem, Massachusetts. His works included; *The Scarlet Letter, The House of the Seven Gables* and *The Blithedale Romance*.

Birthday - Song writer Stephen Foster (1826-1864) was born in Lawrenceville, Pennsylvania. Among his nearly 200 songs were; *Oh! Susanna, Camptown Races, Swanee River, Jeanie with the Light Brown Hair*, and *Beautiful Dreamer*. He died in poverty at Bellevue Hospital in New York.

Birthday - <u>Calvin Coolidge</u> (1872-1933) the 30th U.S. President was born in Plymouth, Vermont. He became President on August 3, 1923, after the death of Warren G. Harding. In 1924, Coolidge was elected President but did not run for re-election in 1928.




