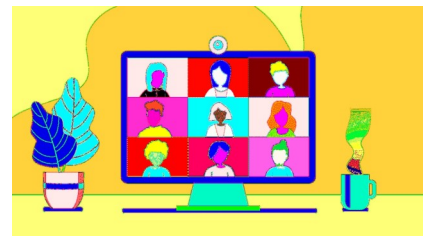

MONUMENTS & MEMORIALS: (Jeanne J. Blaes, PhD) Committee Chair Vacant



Battle of Picacho Pass Monument, Picacho, AZ. For thousands of years the distinctive silhouette of Picacho Peak has guided travelers across the Sonoran Desert. In 1858 the Butterfield Overland Mail Company, a stagecoach delivery company, began using the nearby lowlands on their route connecting Tucson and Phoenix. The most notable event in the mountain's history occurred several years later, after the outbreak of the American Civil War.

On 28 MAR 1861 a delegation in Tucson declared that AZ was a territory of the Confederacy and opposed to the US. Without soldiers or political power, the declaration by secessionists in AZ seemed to have little impact. About a year later, however, cavalry from TX began harassing Arizonans who were still loyal to the US. The rebel cavalry reportedly wanted to make a loud entrance into the American Southwest to attract sympathizers from CA into joining the conflict. This mostly backfired, instead leading to a successful recruitment of Union volunteer regiments to push the Confederates out of the neighboring territory.

The larger goal of the Confederate incursions into AZ was to control the Butterfield Overland Mail stagecoach road and with it, the easiest access to CA. Subsequently, a number of conflicts occurred along that route. On 15 April 1862 a group of Union scouts were on patrol, searching for Confederate scouts that were rumored to be nearby. About a mile north of the Picacho Pass mail station, the Union scouts surprised three Confederate lookouts who surrendered immediately and gave up the Confederate scouts' location.

Although their orders were to report their position and wait for reinforcements, Union officer 1LT James Barrett was eager for a chance to prove himself. The Union soldiers charged at the Confederates and they exchanged fire for 90 minutes. Barrett died almost immediately, and eventually the leaderless Union soldiers retreated. The final toll of the battle was three dead and three wounded on the Union side and two wounded and three captured among the Confederates.

Although this was a fairly inconsequential engagement in the larger picture of the American Civil War, the Battle of Picacho Pass is now remembered by history as the war's westernmost battle. (A skirmish occurred further west at Stanwix Station, but the encounter was so brief and small that most historians don't regard it as a true battle.) It was also the high-water mark of the Confederate's westward advance. Retreats were ordered across AZ and NM, and by July 1862 Confederate troops had returned to TX.

Today, the site of the battle is memorialized within Picacho Peak State Park. Each year, actors put on a reenactment of the battle—the event has grown so popular that many more actors take part in the engagement than actually happened. Many monuments to the battle have been placed at the site, though many were made of wood and fell apart over time. The only remaining monument at the site is a stone pillar commemorating the Confederate soldiers who fought there.

NATIONAL/HOMELAND SECURITY & LAW & ORDER: Vacant, Committee Chair



On 3 MAR 2022, Secretary Mayorkas, Department of Homeland Security (DHS), announced the designation of Ukraine for Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for 18 months. "Russia's premeditated and unprovoked attack on Ukraine has resulted in an ongoing war, senseless violence, and Ukrainians forced to seek refuge in other countries," said Secretary Alejandro N. Mayorkas. "In these extraordinary times, we will continue to offer our support and protection to Ukrainian nationals in the US."

A country may be designated for TPS when conditions in the country fall into one or more of the three statutory bases for designation: ongoing armed conflict, environmental disasters, or extraordinary and temporary conditions. This designation is based on both ongoing armed conflict and extraordinary and temporary conditions in Ukraine that prevent Ukrainian nationals, and those of no nationality who last habitually resided in Ukraine, from returning to Ukraine safely. These conditions result from the full-scale Russian military invasion into Ukraine, which marks the largest conventional military action in Europe since World War II. This invasion has caused a humanitarian crisis with significant numbers of individuals (continued on next page)

fleeing and damage to civilian infrastructure that has left many without electricity or water or access to food, basic supplies, shelter, and emergency medical services.

Individuals eligible for TPS under this designation must have continuously resided in the United States since 1 MAR 2022. Individuals who attempt to travel to the United States after 1 MAR 2022 will not be eligible for TPS. Ukraine's 18-month designation will go into effect on the publication date of the forthcoming Federal Register notice. The Federal Register notice will provide instructions for applying for TPS and an Employment Authorization Document (EAD). TPS applicants must meet all eligibility requirements and undergo security and background checks.

Chaplains Corner

REHAB: YOUR GOD IS GOD

"The LORD your God is God in heaven above and on the earth below." Joshua 2:1-11

Since World War II, the Force RECON branch of US Marine Corps has completed information-gathering missions that can only be accomplished by soldiers on the ground. In today's teachings, Joshua initiated his own on-the-ground intelligence operation. Rather than running headlong into battle, he sent spies into Jericho, the most strategic and fortified city in the region.

The spies arrived after dark and went directly to the house of Rahab, a harlot. Why would they go to this disreputable place? First, it was probably easy for strangers in town to enter her home without raising suspicion. Second, her popular place of business would have been a strategic source of information. And third, located in the city wall, it offered a quick escape route if one became necessary. News of the spies' presence traveled immediately to the king. Jericho was on super-high alert, and its residents had good reason to be afraid. The God of Israel was on the move.

Providentially, though, Rahab understood the spies' mission and was sympathetic to it. She leapt into action and hid the spies under stalks of flax. Then she risked her own safety by lying to the king's men when they pounded on her door.

With the immediate threat abated, Rahab addressed the spies. She began with an acknowledgment, "I know that the LORD has given you this land," and an admission, "all who live in this country are melting in fear" (v. 9). Then Rahab made this shocking declaration: "The LORD your God is God in heaven above and on the earth below" (v. 11).

As a Canaanite, Rahab would have been raised to worship many gods. Yet, in that pivotal moment, she declared that the God of Israel is the one true God.

In our culture today, how boldly do we declare that the Lord is the one true God? Consider what you can learn from Rahab's risky public declaration. Consider how you can speak boldly for God.

PRAYER: Rahab's confession reminds us of the miracle of our own salvation. Great is Your mercy in rescuing us from sin! As we meditate on this joy, give us opportunities to proclaim Your name.

+ MEDIC's CORNER: 12 Ways to Reduce Premature Skin Aging

Many things cause our skin to age. Some things we cannot do anything about; others we can influence. One thing that we cannot change is the natural aging process. It plays a key role. With time, we all get visible lines on our face. It is natural for our face to lose some of its youthful fullness. We notice our skin becoming thinner and drier. Our genes largely control when these changes occur. The medical term for this type of aging is "intrinsic aging."



We can influence another type of aging that affects our skin. Our environment and lifestyle choices can cause our skin to age prematurely. The medical term for this type of aging is "extrinsic aging." By taking some preventive actions, we can slow the effects that premature aging has on our skin.

It's natural to experience thinner, drier skin and an increase in wrinkles as we age. Older skin is more prone to bruises, wrinkles, age spots, skin tags and cancer. Your environment and lifestyle choices can sometimes cause your skin to age prematurely. To prevent premature skin aging, board-certified dermatologists recommend following these simple tips:

- 1. Protect your skin from the sun every day.** The sun plays a major role in prematurely aging our skin. Whether spending a day at the beach or running errands, sun protection is essential. You can protect your skin by seeking shade, covering up with sun-protective clothing (such as a lightweight/long-sleeved shirt, pants, a wide-brimmed hat, and sunglasses with UV protection) and using sunscreen that is broad-spectrum, SPF 30 (or higher), and water-resistant. You should apply sunscreen every day to all skin that is not covered by clothing. For more effective protection, look for clothing with an ultraviolet protection factor (UPF) label. Apply self-tanner rather than get a tan. Every time you get a tan, you prematurely age your skin. This holds true if you get a tan from the sun, a tanning bed, or other indoor tanning equipment. All emit harmful UV rays that accelerate how quickly your skin ages.
- 2. If you smoke, stop.** Smoking greatly speeds up how quickly skin ages. It causes wrinkles and a dull, sallow complexion.
- 3. Avoid repetitive facial expressions.** When you make a facial expression, you contract the underlying muscles. If you repeatedly contract the same muscles for many years, these lines become permanent.
- 4. Wear sunglasses.** Wearing sunglasses can help reduce lines caused by squinting.
- 5. Eat a healthy, well-balanced diet.** Findings from a few studies suggest that eating plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables may help prevent damage that leads to premature skin aging. Findings from research studies also suggest that a diet containing lots of sugar or other refined carbohydrates can accelerate aging.
- 6. Drink less alcohol.** Alcohol is rough on the skin. It dehydrates the skin, and in time, damages the skin. This can make us look older.
- 7. Exercise most days of the week.** Findings from a few studies suggest that moderate exercise can improve circulation and boost the immune system. This may give the skin a more-youthful appearance.
- 8. Cleanse your skin gently.** Scrubbing your skin clean can irritate your skin. Irritating your skin accelerates skin aging. Gentle washing helps to remove pollution, makeup, and other substances without irritating your skin. When you're drying your skin, especially your face, use a towel to pat it dry.
- 9. Wash your face twice a day and after sweating heavily.** Perspiration, especially when wearing a hat or helmet, irritates the skin, so you want to wash your skin as soon as possible after sweating.
- 10. Apply facial and body moisturizer every day.** Moisturizer traps water in our skin, giving it a more youthful appearance. A quality moisturizer is your skin's best friend. It should be your No. 1 most-used skin care product. Any time your skin gets wet, like after washing your face, bathing or swimming, don't forget to moisturize right after. Your skin produces natural oils for a reason - they're good for it.
- 11. Stop using skin care products that sting or burn.** When your skin burns or stings, it means your skin is irritated. Irritating your skin can make it look older. *Note: Some anti-aging products prescribed by a dermatologist may burn or sting. When using a prescription anti-aging product, this can be OK. Just be sure to let your dermatologist know.
- 12. Use a humidifier.** Your skin and hair love moisture. Humidity keeps your skin hydrated, supple and buoyant, plus it's good for the respiratory system.
