COMMANDER'S REPORT:

As we begin preparing for the 2025 operating year's (OY2025) activities and projects before us, let's take a moment to get caught up on some exciting developments within our Order. First up a grateful shout out to all those fellow companions who contributed to a wonderful and successful 2025 National Convention in Tucson, Arizona this year. During the first week of August, we hosted fellow companions visiting from throughout the country and abroad here in Tucson. Highlights included a historic reimagining of our traditional and long dormant MOWW Historic Marker Placement Ceremonial Events, once occurring with greater frequency during the early 20th century. Our most notable such projects a still being visited by local companions every Veterans Day in such renown veteran service cemeteries such as Arlington National Cemetery and in the city of Bayamon, Puerto Rico abroad. We can now proudly add the Arizona Veterans' Memorial Cemetery in Marana, AZ (west Tucson) to the list of prominent MOWW historical marker placements throughout the world. Next month's newsletter will have a "full spread" with plenty of photos on our very successful national convention event - so stay tuned.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Welcome back everybody. A quick review of our initial Santa Cruz Valley Chapter AZ-193 finances shows us in great shape, as we begin the current OY2025 activity season. Our strong finance numbers is mainly due to our very successful chapter fundraising efforts during our recent week-long national convention [4-9 AUG 2025] planning and the awesome fundraising generosity of visiting companions from throughout the Order stateside and from Puerto Rico and Hawaii. In all, we were able to collect enough funding to replenish our administrative (ADMIN) and operational and management (O&M) chapter replenishment funding Chapter Budget targets of \$500 ADMIN and \$1000 O&M respectively. We were also able to partially replenish our patriotic education (PE) funding target budget sector goal at currently one-third the needed funding and our standalone Chapter Arizona Youth Leadership Conference (AZYLC) is currently stable at around \$3K (with our usual Green Valley Arizona IRS 501c3 Country Fair White Elephant Grant Program funding request - "CFWE") already submitted and entered into the annual OY2025 funding chapter external funding solicitation pipeline, as of early August. Lastly, our chapter has already also complied with all MOWW annual IRS Reporting mandatory requirements and is eligible once again for MOWW Perpetual and Memorial (P&M) dividend MOWW HQ payout consideration again this operating year.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

Greetings from Tucson to all our returning companions, affiliates, partnered veteran service organizational colleagues, and supportive family and friends. While fresh out of closing out a very successful OY2024 annual closure and our usual very productive national awards season where we once again placed among the top three MOWW performing chapters for 2024 and even took top "Chapter of the Year" honors once again in the Medium Category, we begin once again accruing our wins for the new operating year currently before us. Of paramount coordination importance is establishing our operating year Chapter meeting calendar which includes planning our big 40th Chapter Anniversary event in October, planning our two Massing of the Colors signature events for the months of November 2025 and January 2026, and revising our Chapter Action Plan (CAP) for the current operating year's events, activities and projects. 
VSO-1: WOW [W] HYB VCC MTG - JUL 2025


MOWW: CAC [Q] VCC MTG - JUL 2025


MOWW: NCSC Monthly VCC MTG - JUL 2025

The MOWW national Convention and Seminars Committee met via ZOOM several times in the month of July - leading up to the execution of the 2025 National Convention during the first week of August [4-9 AUG 2025] at the Desert Diamond Hotel & Casino in southeastern Tucson, AZ. The collaboration from the local community, partnered veteran service organizations, and MOWW national resources brought to bear were superb and ensured a most successful convention venue which exceeded all expectations.

MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

Our First Big Vietnam Battle

On 28 October 1965, our heavy artillery battalion debarked a troopship at Qui Nhon, and convoyed to An Khe, the 1st Cavalry Division's brand-new base camp on Highway 19 in Vietnam's Central Highlands. After a week of waiting for the ballistic meteorology equipment and



the big field pieces, 8-inch howitzers and 175-millimeter guns, to be off-loaded from our ship, word came that several 1st Cav units were in a fierce, bloody fight with North Vietnam Army (NVA) regulars at Ia Drang Valley, 50 miles to the west-southwest. While giving wind and air density adjustments for Division's smaller howitzers, 105s, one of the men of Division's meteorology section was wounded and their theodolite shot up.

In future battles, my section went to battle sites and DIVARTY's section

stayed at An Khe. Two lieutenants from my tent, an observer and pilot, flew to Ia Drang to spot 105 fires; another had the sad task of helping retrieve our dead. First indication of casualties from Ia Drang was that the division's 7th Cavalry had 79 killed. That would increase to 300. The NVA death toll was much larger. Our troops defeated the NVA effort, for the start of full-scale war. I walked over to 7th Cavalry's An Khe base camp and stopped before a white cross, about four feet high, a memorial to the 79. As I stood at that cross, a young trooper, rifle slung on shoulder, face sweaty, fatigues soiled as if he had been prone on the ground, came toward me at a trot. It was clear he had just been flown back from Ia Drang. With a smile acknowledging the surprise thrust on me, he threw a salute and shouted "GARRY OWEN,"* the Cavalry greeting. I returned the salute. He trotted on. TLC

"Garry Owen" came from an Irish tune that Lt. Colonel (Civil War Major General) George Armstrong Custer adopted as a morale-builder. In 1876, his 7th Cavalry suffered defeat at the Little Big Horn.



We welcome fellow Santa Cruz Valley Chapter - 193 companion CWO (RET) Theodore L. "Ted" Cogut, USA to our monthly newsletter writing staff contributor team for the new year. Ted transferred his chapter membership affiliation over to our chapter from the former Catalina Mountains Chapter which operated out of east Tucson until this past June 2022 when they ceased operations. Ted was also a very active chapter newsletter article writer for the CM Chapter, contributing regularly to the "Ted's Page" monthly entry where he routinely provided very interesting and entertaining articles for that publication. With the addition and 2023 launching of Ted's Page to our monthly publication, we hope will further enhance our publication's outreach among our chapter readership and general public outreach appeal. JULY IN HISTORY

July 1

July 1st - Canada Day, a national holiday in Canada, formerly known as Dominion Day, commemorating the confederation of Upper and Lower Canada and some of the Maritime Provinces into the Dominion of Canada on July 1, 1867.

July 1, 1862 - President Abraham Lincoln signed the first income tax bill, levying a 3% income tax on annual incomes of \$600-\$10,000 and a 5% tax on incomes over \$10,000. Also on this day, the Bureau of Internal Revenue was established by an Act of Congress.

July 1, 1863 - Beginning of the Battle of Gettysburg during the American Civil War.

July 1, 1893 - President Grover Cleveland underwent secret cancer surgery aboard a yacht owned by his friend, Commodore E.C. Benedict. The surgery was performed on a cancerous growth in his mouth. The entire left side of his jaw was removed along with a small portion of his soft palate. A second, smaller operation was performed on July 17th. Cleveland was then fitted with a rubber prosthesis which he wore until his death in 1908. The secrecy was intended to prevent panic among the public during the economic depression of 1893.

July 2

July 2, 1776 - The Continental Congress in Philadelphia adopted the following resolution, originally introduced on June 7, by <u>Richard Henry Lee</u> of Virginia: "Resolved, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved. That it is expedient forthwith to take the most effectual measures for forming foreign Alliances. That a plan of confederation be prepared and transmitted to the respective Colonies for their consideration and approbation."

July 2, 1788 - Congress announced the <u>United States Constitution</u> had been ratified by the required nine states and that a committee had been appointed to make preparations for the new American government.

July 2, 1881 - President <u>James A. Garfield</u> was shot and mortally wounded as he entered a railway station in Washington, D.C. He died on September 19th.

July 2, 1917 - A race riot occurred in St. Louis, Missouri, resulting in an estimated 75 African Americans killed and hundreds injured. To protest the violence against blacks, W.E.B. DuBois and James Weldon Johnson later led a silent march down Fifth Avenue in New York.

July 2, 1964 - President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1964, prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race in public accommodations, publicly owned or operated facilities, employment and union membership and in voter registration. The Act allowed for cutoff of Federal funds in places where discrimination remained.

Birthday - The first African American on the U.S. Supreme Court, Thurgood Marshall (1908-1993) was born in Baltimore, Maryland. Nominated by President Johnson, he began his 24-year career on the High Court in 1967.

July 3

July 3, 1775 - During the American Revolution, George Washington took command of the Continental Army at Cambridge, Massachusetts.

July 3, 1976 - The raid on Entebbe airport in Uganda occurred as an Israeli commando unit rescued 103 hostages on a hijacked Air France airliner. The jet had been en route from Tel Aviv to Paris when it was hijacked by pro-Palestinian guerrillas. Three hostages, seven hijackers and twenty Ugandan soldiers were killed during the rescue.

July 3, 1988 - Iran Air Flight 655 was destroyed while flying over the Persian Gulf after the U.S. Navy Warship *Vincennes* fired two surface-to-air missiles, killing all 290 passengers aboard. A subsequent U.S. military inquiry cited stress related human failure for the mistaken identification of the civilian airbus as an enemy F-14 fighter jet.

July 4

July 4, 1776 - The <u>Declaration of Independence</u> was approved by the Continental Congress.

July 4, 1863- Vicksburg, the last Confederate stronghold on the Mississippi River, surrendered to General Grant and the Army of the West after a six week siege. With the Union in control of the Mississippi, the Confederacy was effectively split in two, cut off from its western allies.

July 4, 1882 - The "Last Great Buffalo Hunt" began on Indian reservation lands near Hettinger, North Dakota as 2,000 Teton Sioux Indians in full hunting regalia killed about 5,000 buffalo. By this time, most of the estimated 60-75 million buffalo in America had been killed by white hunters who usually took the hides and left the meat to rot. By 1883, the last of the free-ranging buffalo were gone.
