COMMANDER'S REPORT:

As we enter the next-to last month of the current 2023-2024 operating year, I wish to thank all our chapter fellow companion family for the support provided this season. At our last regular membership meeting, we identified and confirmed the chapter leadership slate of officers for the upcoming 2024-2025 operating year. Our congratulations and gratitude to all those who have agreed to continue to serve our chapter membership for the new year. It also fills me with personal pride that our chapter seems to be headed for yet another outstanding operational year - having accomplished splendidly all of its stated 2023-2024 Chapter Action Plan goals. Among the most notable, is having completed it stated chapter annual recruitment goal of six new chapter companions for the current operating year, having been reinstated back to its full recruitment activity status by achieving and subsequently surpassing the desired IRS 501c19 "veterans-to-non-veteran" 75 to 25 percentage ratio challenge, and posturing the chapter to prominently be very competitive for this year's GAS Pershing Chapter of the Year national award consideration.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

As of the publishing of this financial report, the current Chapter accounts are as follows; CHASE BUSINESS ACCOUNT - Checking: \$1,836.36 USDs and Savings: \$620.94 USDs respectively. All account balance information has been reconciled and annotated. It is also worth mentioning that there is a pending MOWW P&M Dividend payout yet to be electronically deposited into the account in the amount of \$1,568.94 USDs (based upon the HQ MOWW tabulation of 293 perpetual & memorial fellow companions x the per companion distribution of \$5.35 USDs). While our chapter spent a total of \$878.53 USDs in online MOWW Store awards and decorations inventory replenishment efforts to help meet the increased R-13 ASP materials and support services in the month of April, our chapter account finds itself in excellent shape headed into its final two months of operations – with a total of \$4,026.24 USDs in available ADMIN, O&M, and PE funds for the reminder of the 2023-2024 operating year.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

Our chapter is currently in the final stages of a very successful annual ROTC-JROTC awards recognition season - having provided award materials and support services to a total of 25 (23 JROTC / 2 ROTC) academic institutions and a total of 62 (56 JROTC / 6 ROTC) medal packages along with accompanying award citations and gold embossed citation folders, and a total of 48 awarded MOWW Certificates of Appreciation between two JROTC school programs. Other GAS Pershing Chapter of the Year national award considerations include; having achieved our 100% quota goal of newly recruited fellow companions six [6 required] for the current 2023-2024 operating year (of which all are former veterans), and still having an additional three [3] new chapter recruited fellow companion applications yet to be processed for the upcoming 2024-2025 operating year which begins on 1 JULY. Our Chapter was only one of two local chapters (in the entire MOWW organization) to conduct two [2] chapter hosted Massing of the Colors - Service of Remembrance Ceremony signature events. Hot on the heels of a very successful annual ROTC-JROTC awards season, we are now in the pre-Arizona Youth Leadership Conference (AZYLC 2024) summer program student delegate candidate and nomination application window. As a standing member of the Arizona Youth Leadership, Inc. (AZYL, Inc) IRS 501c3 non-profit organization, our chapter plans to provide this year's AZYLC 2024 summer program which at least thirteen [13] student delegate sponsored participation slots (comparable to our sponsorship contribution last year for AZYLC 2023) to a more diverse JROTC program, Scouting / Explorer participants, and participating academic institution student scholars. Until next month's report, I echo our chapter commander's congratulations to all who have contributed to our success this operating year.






VSO-3: TVAC Monthly VCC MTG - MAR 2024

R-13: SUSD NJROTC Awards Event - APR 2024

Our chapter is having another "banner year" ROTC-JROTC annual awards recognition season for the 2023-2024 operating year. Not only have all existing school partnerships returned this year but we have also added a third state (five new local central New Mexico JROTC programs) to out annual support activities working calendar. Referred to as the Region XIII awards Support Program (R-13 ASP) initiative, our chapter provides award recognition packages throughout southern Arizona, and the entire state of Utah.

MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

Change of Station

Base Weather had been in a hangar at Westover but at Selfridge it was in one end of the stately-brick base headquarters. There were many familiar things, map tables, lighted tracing table, high-legged stools, facsimile machine, teletypes. Of course, just as at his last base, the forecaster could rely on the gas laws and their meteorological effects such as the dry adiabatic lapse rate, 5.4 degrees F per thousand feet. With a decrease for water vapor, that could predict the altitude of cumulus formation. addition to small Lake St. Clair, immediately beside Selfridge, an air mass absorbed moisture from the vastly larger Great Lakes, impacting Selfridge from all sides except when airflow was directly from the south. From that direction, industry at close-by Detroit brought condensation nuclei for cloud or fog formation. Identifying incoming weather systems and calculating their movements was basic. This was 1948. I brought from Westover a piece of clear plastic upon which I had etched 12-and 24-hour system movements with concomitant windspeeds, my calculator before calculators. Laid upon a map similar to the geostrophic wind speed scale, the device quickly showed a weather system's next predictable position. Such shortcuts gave me time for careful weather map analysis, briefing pilots, and answering phone calls. Aircraft at Selfridge, a fighter base, were short range as compared to Westover's C-54s. These were the new P-80 and a few remaining P-51s and P-47s of

WWII fame. For routine "milk run" flights, there were the single engine AT-6 and two-engine C-45. The latter a variant of the bombardier trainer AT-11 in which, two years earlier, I had my first flight. I snapped the C-45 photo below at Tucson's Pima Air and Space Museum. For a few weeks until I could find a house, we lived at Marie's parents' home. She, or my father-in-law then on vacation from the Dodge truck factory in Detroit's interior suburb of Hamtramck, drove me 20 miles to the base for my forecaster shifts. Though she was careful to stay only long enough for a 'hello" and "good bye" in that busy place, Marie made visits to the weather station to get our mail, temporarily being received there.



One day, with an almost impish and always becoming smile, she burst into Base Weather, saying: "I bought a car!" It was a 1938 Chevrolet, 10 years old but with a retrofitted truck motor. No longer a pretty car, yet it was the most reliable we would ever have, and one we could afford. Marie typified the military spouse, always arriving with solutions. She took the mail and I went back to my map, drawing isobars. Making the next weather map was a continuous process. **TLC**

APRIL IN HISTORY

April 1

April 1, 1865 - During the American <u>Civil War</u>, Confederate troops of General George Pickett were defeated and cut off at Five Forks, Virginia. This sealed the fate of Confederate General Robert E. Lee's armies at Petersburg and Richmond and hastened the end of the war

April 1, 1998 - A federal judge in Little Rock, Arkansas, dismissed a sexual harassment case against President Bill Clinton, stating the case had no "genuine issues" worthy of trial. Although President Clinton had denied any wrongdoing, a unanimous ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court in May 1997 allowed the case to proceed, thereby establishing a precedent allowing sitting presidents to be sued for personal conduct that allegedly occurred before taking office.

April 2

April 2, 1513 - Spanish explorer Ponce De Leon sighted Florida and claimed it for the Spanish Crown after landing at the site of present day St. Augustine, now the oldest city in the continental U.S.

April 2, 1792 - Congress established the first U.S. Mint at Philadelphia.

April 2, 1863 - A bread riot occurred in the Confederate capital of Richmond, Virginia, as angry people demanded bread from a bakery wagon then wrecked nearby shops. The mob dispersed only after Confederate President <u>Jefferson Davis</u> made a personal plea and threatened to use force.

April 2, 1865 - General Robert E. Lee informed Confederate President Jefferson Davis that he must evacuate the Confederate capital at Richmond, Virginia. Davis and his cabinet then fled by train.

April 2, 1982 - The beginning of the Falkland Islands War as troops from Argentina invaded and occupied the British colony located near the tip of South America. The British retaliated and defeated the Argentineans on June 15, 1982, after ten weeks of combat, with about 1,000 lives lost.

Birthday - Fairy tale author Hans Christian Andersen (1805-1875) was born in Odense, Denmark. He created 168 fairy tales for children including the classics *The Princess and the Pea*, *The Snow Queen* and *The Nightingale*.

Birthday - French writer Emile Zola (1840-1902) was born in Paris. His works included a series of 20 books known as the *Rougon-Macquart Novels* in which he defined men and women as products of heredity and environment, portraying them as victims of their own passions and circumstances of birth. In his later years, he became involved in resolving the Dreyfus affair, a political-military scandal in which Captain Alfred Dreyfus had been wrongly accused of selling military secrets to the Germans was sent to Devil's Island.

April 3

April 3, 1860 - In the American West, the Pony Express service began as the first rider departed St. Joseph, Missouri. For \$5 an ounce, letters were delivered 2,000 miles to California within ten days. The famed Pony Express riders each rode from 75 to 100 miles before handing the letters off to the next rider. A total of 190 way stations were located about 15 miles apart. The service lasted less than two years, ending upon the completion of the overland telegraph.

April 3, 1865 - The Confederate capital of Richmond surrendered to Union forces after the withdrawal of General Robert E. Lee's troops.

April 3, 1944 - The U.S. Supreme Court ruled 8 to 1 that African Americans can not be barred from voting in the Texas Democratic primaries. The Court stated that discrimination against blacks violates the 15th Amendment and that political parties are not private associations.

April 3, 1948 - President <u>Harry S. Truman</u> signed the European Recovery Program, better known as the Marshall Plan, intended to stop the spread of Communism and restore the economies of European countries devastated by World War II. Over four years, the program distributed \$12 billion to the nations of Western Europe. The program was first proposed by Secretary of State George C. Marshall during a historic speech at Harvard University on June 5, 1947.

April 3, 1995 - Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor became the first woman to preside over the Court, sitting in for Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist who was out of town.

Birthday - American writer Washington Irving (1783-1859) was born in New York City. His works include; *Rip Van Winkle*, *The Legend of Sleepy Hollow* and historical biographies such as the *Life of Washington*.

Birthday - Tammany Hall 'Boss' William M. Tweed (1823-1878) was born in New York City. From 1851 to 1871, his 'Tweed Ring' of political corruption looted millions from New York City, bringing the city to the verge of bankruptcy. Methods included padding city bills by 85 percent and writing checks to non-existent persons and companies. His power was broken after a series of critical editorial cartoons by Thomas Nast were published in *Harper's Weekly* magazine. Tweed was arrested and convicted on charges of larceny and forgery. He died in prison.
