COMMANDER'S REPORT:

Hello from southern Arizona once again. As we now find our local chapter operations winding down for the current 2022-2023 OY activity season, this does not necessarily mean that our daily operational tempo will also start to slow down. Quite the opposite, as you all will notice, we have been operating at near full capacity trying to support all our scheduled commitments and challenging events and activities schedule. To everyone's credit, our chapter is set to finish another very productive and banner year once again - having taken on the added challenges of assuming two chapter's worth of community support projects and activities in east Tucson and surrounding communities. A very special and heartfelt thanks goes out to all those who have stepped up to take on even more on to your personal activity schedules by volunteering to represent our Order and local chapter at the many award presentation ceremonies this year. Let's keep up the great work and finish as strong as we began, come June 2023.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

As briefed at our last Santa Cruz Valley Chapter locale meeting, our chapter has managed its financial resources well, regardless of the challenges posed by an increase in our activity season operations and at the same time an expected decrease in our usual funding income revenue resources. We enter the final fourth quart of 2022-2023 OY chapter operations with a slight surplus in budgeted funding of about \$200.00 USDs. Anticipated fourth quarter expenditures are well within our current funding parameters, as our received MOWW P&M Dividend was not as low this year, the payment received was right in line with what we would otherwise receive as a small chapter operation. If everyone recalls, our 2022-2023 OY approved Chapter Budget Plan was based upon continued small chapter operations, even though we had transitioned into a medium chapter category operation - therefore not impacting our chapter operations all that much. I am also happy to report that we have progressed with the selection of Vantage West Credit Union as our preferred banking institution where we will establish our AZYLC Fund account. We have also met with the bank representative and the formal appointment to launch the account will be forthcoming in about a month or SO.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

I congratulate our chapter for a great operating year thus far – as we continue to "crush" our stated Chapter Action Plan seasonal goals. While it seems that we will achieve most of our goals this year; including those added to accommodate the influx of newly transitioning fellow companions from the former Catalina Mountains Chapter in east Tucson, we still have one major hurdle standing between our chapter submitting to compete for the General of the armies Chapter of the Year National Award or risk being disqualified for submission due mainly to our inability this OY to recruit at least one new fellow companion into our chapter ranks thus far. For the first time in over 15 years, our chapter has failed to recruit one new chapter fellow companion in the first half of the OY. We still have three months left in the current OY to meet the threshold of gaining one [1] new chapter fellow companion but (even better) would prefer to reach our designated goal of three [3] new chapter fellow companions to be able to submit proudly achieving our four percentage chapter growth quota for the year by the last day of June 2023. We have identified many opportunities to reach our strategic goal-1 objective if we are able to get three Junior ROTC instructors to take us up on our sponsored one-year regular membership offer – at zero cost to the newly recruited fellow companion. Let's please leave no stone unturned in seeking opportunities to bring in those three needed fellow companions this year. Our chapter is also accepting nominations for this year's SCV Chapter national citation award. Please contact yours truly with your nomination recommendations soonest.







Military Friends

Good friend Donald Anderson and I met in basic training at Keesler Field, Mississippi. In basic, where everyone was a stranger, one looked for someone from a down-home area. We were from Michigan.



When that training ended, a sergeant examined our Army aptitude test scores. Those with the highest scores could choose their Air Corps job. I was surprised to find myself in that group. I thought of asking for radio but in a rare moment of brilliance asked what military occupations required one to have the highest test scores. It was meteorology and cryptology. As I pondered, "Andy," as anyone named Anderson was called in the Army Air Corps, saw me and asked, "You took meteorology didn't you?" Ail I knew about meteorology was that success on our Michigan farm had depended on the weather. Few these days would believe that no one in the World War Two general public knew anything about meteorology. After Pearl Harbor, what little was said about weather on radio was banned for fear it could aid America's enemies. Andy said in meteorology you would sit in an airfield office, draw lines on maps and mark areas with colored pencils. Andy convinced me, I took meteorology. I met good friend Howard Klier after graduating from two rudimentary meteorology-related schools and was in shift work at Westover Field, Massachusetts.

No, he wasn't from Michigan, but Minnesota was close enough. After he left the Air Corps, his wife, Ardis, and my Marie became good friends. I had met good friend Jack Van Roy in my Weather Observer School. We both were later graduates of the Weather Forecaster School, still later of Specialized High Altitude Forecasting, and would serve together as weather forecasters on the USAF's island base of Kindley field, Bermuda. After retiring from the Air

APRIL IN HISTORY

April 1

April 1, 1865 - During the American <u>Civil War</u>, Confederate troops of General George Pickett were defeated and cut off at Five Forks, Virginia. This sealed the fate of Confederate General Robert E. Lee's armies at Petersburg and Richmond and hastened the end of the war

April 1, 1998 - A federal judge in Little Rock, Arkansas, dismissed a sexual harassment case against President Bill Clinton, stating the case had no "genuine issues" worthy of trial. Although President Clinton had denied any wrongdoing, a unanimous ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court in May 1997 allowed the case to proceed, thereby establishing a precedent allowing sitting presidents to be sued for personal conduct that allegedly occurred before taking office.

April 2

April 2, 1513 - Spanish explorer Ponce De Leon sighted Florida and claimed it for the Spanish Crown after landing at the site of present day St. Augustine, now the oldest city in the continental U.S.

April 2, 1792 - Congress established the first U.S. Mint at Philadelphia.

April 2, 1863 - A bread riot occurred in the Confederate capital of Richmond, Virginia, as angry people demanded bread from a bakery wagon then wrecked nearby shops. The mob dispersed only after Confederate President <u>Jefferson Davis</u> made a personal plea and threatened to use force.

April 2, 1865 - General Robert E. Lee informed Confederate President Jefferson Davis that he must evacuate the Confederate capital at Richmond, Virginia. Davis and his cabinet then fled by train.

April 2, 1982 - The beginning of the Falkland Islands War as troops from Argentina invaded and occupied the British colony located near the tip of South America. The British retaliated and defeated the Argentineans on June 15, 1982, after ten weeks of combat, with about 1,000 lives lost.

Birthday - Fairy tale author Hans Christian Andersen (1805-1875) was born in Odense, Denmark. He created 168 fairy tales for children including the classics *The Princess and the Pea*, *The Snow Queen* and *The Nightingale*.

Birthday - French writer Emile Zola (1840-1902) was born in Paris. His works included a series of 20 books known as the *Rougon-Macquart Novels* in which he defined men and women as products of heredity and environment, portraying them as victims of their own passions and circumstances of birth. In his later years, he became involved in resolving the Dreyfus affair, a political-military scandal in which Captain Alfred Dreyfus had been wrongly accused of selling military secrets to the Germans was sent to Devil's Island.

April 3

April 3, 1860 - In the American West, the Pony Express service began as the first rider departed St. Joseph, Missouri. For \$5 an ounce, letters were delivered 2,000 miles to California within ten days. The famed Pony Express riders each rode from 75 to 100 miles before handing the letters off to the next rider. A total of 190 way stations were located about 15 miles apart. The service lasted less than two years, ending upon the completion of the overland telegraph.

April 3, 1865 - The Confederate capital of Richmond surrendered to Union forces after the withdrawal of General Robert E. Lee's troops.

April 3, 1944 - The U.S. Supreme Court ruled 8 to 1 that African Americans can not be barred from voting in the Texas Democratic primaries. The Court stated that discrimination against blacks violates the 15th Amendment and that political parties are not private associations.

April 3, 1948 - President <u>Harry S. Truman</u> signed the European Recovery Program, better known as the Marshall Plan, intended to stop the spread of Communism and restore the economies of European countries devastated by World War II. Over four years, the program distributed \$12 billion to the nations of Western Europe. The program was first proposed by Secretary of State George C. Marshall during a <u>historic speech</u> at Harvard University on June 5, 1947.

April 3, 1995 - Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor became the first woman to preside over the Court, sitting in for Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist who was out of town.
