COMMANDER'S REPORT:

Season's Greetings to everyone. Hoping this month's Chapter Newsletter edition finds everyone in good health and in the best of spirits. Apart from helping to usher in the new calendar year, the month of December also serves as our current operating year midway point and a time to reflect upon how the progress that has been made thus far regarding our stated Chapter Action Plan (CAP) goals. Our Adjutant's CAP summary customarily is published in the January edition which will come out next month. For now, suffice to share with you all that we are one-third into our Chapter operating year recruitment efforts with four more pending Chapter recruitments needed to meet our designated annual "total of six new Chapter fellow companions" to accomplish our stated CAP goal in that respect. Speaking of recruitment, please note that there will be an across-the-board recruitment amount dues increase that will enter into effect on the first of the new year. Please refer to the national MOWW website for further details. Regardless of the recruitment pricing increase we are always very appreciative of any fellow companion's efforts to identify and bring to our Chapter leadership attention any potential new qualified recruitment prospects for consideration. Lastly, at last count, our Chapter is at 74.2 percent on our IRS 501c19 (75 vs 25 veteran-tocivilian percentage status compliance) shortfall. The addition of two newly recruited fellow companions should place us above the 75 veteran percentage threshold which will also allow us to come off our current Chapter recruitment of only military service recruitment candidate restriction. On behalf of yours truly and my family, we want to wish you all a wonderful Christmas and most joyous Happy New Year 2024.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Hello everyone. As of December 2023, our Chapter banking balances are as follows; CHASE Checking - \$1,559.45 USDs and Savings - \$2,730.87 USDs. The current balance amounts confirm and reflect a deposit from the Country Fair White Elephant Grant Committee in Green Valley, Arizona of our requested grant amount of \$3,500.00 USDs. Our Chapter AZYLC Fund account remains at \$5,059.48 USDs with no donations having been received to date. Although it is our fondest hope that our Chapter will qualify for and possibly receive an annual MOWW P&M Dividend payout this coming year, prospects continue to fade. This means that our Chapter will need to step up and identify an additional annual MOWW Chapter Activity funding source to help replenish the anticipated void left by the annual MOWW P&M fund payout of years past. Wishing everyone a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year 2024.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

Merry Christmas to everyone. Our Chapter recruitment efforts to continue a positive trend, providing an emphatic caveat emphasis to the remarks already provided by our Chapter commander in his comments. We ask every Chapter member to do their due diligence in leaving no stone unturned in identifying and reporting fresh recruitment leads whenever possible. All other Chapter Action Plan stated goals continue as scheduled for completion by the end of our current operating year on the last day of June 2024. As our Treasurer has also highlighted, financial contingency planning efforts will start soon to identify another viable Chapter annual source of grant donation or revenue source to help offset the impact of decreased traditional P&M funding. On that note, we ask every fellow companion to please check your sources for any potential leads we can explore during the remainder of the current operating year. Lastly, in the new year we will begin our Chapter concerted planning efforts to serve as host of the MOWW national convention in August of 2025 (NC25). While much preliminary coordination has been already accomplished (i.e., locking in the convention hotel location and doing a preliminary walk through of the facilities and services) there is still much to be done by way of establishing and locking in our proposed convention tours pacakges, pricing and service support details. Effective planning and execution will require a total Region XIII combined resources effort that will start in 2024 and continue until event execution in late 2025. Until next month and hoping to see everyone back in the new year. God Bless.

The Missing in America Project (MIAP) veterans support organization was started by Vietnam era veterans and was launched nationwide in January, 2007. MIAP is a registered 501(c)3 Non-profit Corporation. Its intention is to locate, identify and inter the unclaimed cremains of American veterans. As one of our Chapter's primary local veteran community partners, the Santa Cruz Valley Chapter actively supports and participates in two bi-annually hosted military burial ceremonies to lay to rest these deserving veterans.

MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

A Berlin Airlift Christmastime Event

At Westover Field, Massachusetts, on a day in the Christmas season of 1948, the Base Operations (Base Ops) officer, a lieutenant, received a stressful message. As on most USAF bases, Base Ops was immediately next to Base Weather; and completely unlike his usual composed self, the lieutenant ran into Base



Weather, yelling *FORECASTER!* The crisis: A plane inbound over the Atlantic could be running out of fuel, and — it was presidential aircraft. Probably bound for Washington, its pilot called the Atlanticcrossing experts at Westover. Upper air charts were based on radiosonde data and we routinely drew two on a prescribed worldwide midnight and noon Greenwich time schedule, roughly for the 18,000- and 10,000-foot-levels; and for certain aircraft we drew one for about 5.000 feet. (Later, for jet aircraft, we also drew the 300-millibar-pressure chart, roughly 30,000 feet.) I was a fairly new forecaster. Lindbergh had made the first America to Europe flyover only 21 years earlier; yet, this 20-year-old was at ease forecasting for Atlantic flights, having gained much forecasting experience from airlift's heavy traffic. But this was the presidential aircraft. If not oxygen equipped, it probably was at 10,000 feet where the component headwind was strong and even

worse above. Should the plane drop to lower altitude? Grabbing a chart plotted with 5,000foot data, I quickly-drew contours to expose its wind field and from it rapidly made wind forecasts for that height. Air flowing from our cold land would create turbulence over the relatively warm ocean, more so at low heights. 5,000 feet, the plane would run into particularly rough bumpiness; staying, however, at the present height merely for little more passenger comfort could be disastrous — simply not in the equation. As I jotted the 5,000-foot winds on a note pad, I saw the headwind component was less severe. But was it enough? The lieutenant grabbed the pad, ran to Base Ops, and radioed my 5,000-foot winds to the pilot.

I heard nothing more. I wouldn't know if the pilot dropped to lower altitude, regardless, his calling for wind update was wise. Years later I read in Vice President Barkley's memoir, *That Reminds Me*, that he, not President Truman, was aboard as well as these other VIPs: the military's great friend Bob Hope and Irving Berlin and their wives, also, the showgirls Radio City Rockettes, and magazine cover-girl Jinx Falkenberg. They had been on Bob Hope's Christmas show for the Berlin Airlift troops—and returned, to a young forecaster's great relief, safely.

DECEMBER IN HISTORY

December 1

December 1, 1640 - A nationalist revolution in Portugal led to independence from Spain as the Spanish garrisons were driven out of Portugal.

December 1, 1822 - Dom Pedro, founder of the Brazilian Empire, was crowned as the first emperor of Brazil.

December 1, 1918 - Iceland was granted independence by the Danish parliament.

December 1, 1919 - Lady Nancy Astor became the first woman in the British House of Commons.

December 1, 1925 - The Locarno Treaties were signed by France, Belgium and Germany, as a preventitive measure to avoid another war, in the aftermath of <u>World War I</u>. Terms of the <u>Locarno Pact</u> were guaranteed by Britain and Italy.

December 1, 1941 - The American Civil Air Patrol (CAP), a U.S. Air Force auxiliary, was founded as Director of Civilian Defense, former New York Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia, signed the formal order. The CAP currently provides aerospace education, a CAP cadet program, and emergency services such as locating missing aircraft.

December 1, 1942 - The Beveridge Report was published in Britain envisioning the welfare state including insurance for the entire population.

December 1, 1955 - The birth of the modern American civil rights movement occurred as Rosa Parks was arrested in Montgomery, Alabama, for refusing to give up her seat to a white man and move to the back section of a municipal bus. Her arrest resulted in a year-long boycott of the city bus system by African Americans and led to legal actions ending racial segregation on municipal buses throughout the South.

December 1, 1988 - Benazir Bhutto was nominated to become prime minister of Pakistan, the first woman to govern a Muslim nation.

December 1, 1989 - Mikhail Gorbachev became the first Soviet Russian leader to visit the Vatican and meet the Pope, thus ending 72 years of strict atheist policy in Communist Russia.

December 1, 1990 - England was connected to mainland Europe for the first time since the Ice Age as engineers digging a railway tunnel under the English Channel broke through the last rock layer.

December 1, 1994 - The head of the U.N. Commission on Rwanda estimated 500,000 deaths had resulted from genocide.

December 2, 1804 - Napoleon Bonaparte was crowned Emperor of France by Pope Pius VII in Paris.

December 2, 1805 - Napoleon defeated Russia and Austria in the Battle of Austerlitz.

Well, there are several ways you can help—the main way is to join the Order, if eligible. Consider supporting the Order by contributing financially to its efforts if your are not eligible to join.
