TREASURER'S REPORT:

Happy New Year to everyone. As of JAN 2024, the Chapter account balances are as follows; Chapter CHASE BUSINESS Account - Checking - \$1,038.84 USDs and Savings - \$1,330.89 USDs after all event and inventory supply purchases and replenishments has been factored in and reconciled for the second half of the current 2023-2024 OY. The Chapter US BANK AZYLC FUND Account is still showing a balance of \$5,059.48 USDs with no donations having been received to date. Based upon last year's \$7,137.00 USD AZYLC 2023 expense, the current fund account will be short by \$2,077.52 USDs - requiring further chapter fundraising efforts, if we are to sponsor 12 or more student delegates for the AZYLC 2024 registration window which begins in late March or early April of this year.

MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

The Airlift's Great Accomplishments

At Westover Field near the end of 1948, with the Airlift proving a success I waited for the transfer to Selfridge that I had requested of 8th' Weather Squadron's station chief MSgt. Karl Abrahamson (later CWO). I had been employing perseverance learned as a boy on a Great Depression farm to now help draw, often erase, and then redraw 500 millibar contours, thereby putting them, as I believed, in their most scientifically logical map positions; and from them predict flight-level winds. Resulting forecast-wind accuracy was appreciated by Base Weather's staff as the two examples following seem to show. Several evenings, Sgt. Abrahamson picked me up at the barracks to take me in his 1938 Packard to his home where his wife and two small boys sat waiting at a lace-tableclothed table under a Chrystal chandelier. (A huge contrast with the mess hall!). At the end of a fine meal, during which I tasted fine wine for the first time, Sgt. Abrahamson would take me back to barracks. Young enlisted men at that time couldn't afford cars and to see me drop out of Abrahamson's Packard made an impression. On some Sunday mornings as I finished a map, Major Fava, the detachment commander, suggested we walk to chapel for Sunday services. (In 1948, an enlisted man and officer rarely, if ever, associated off duty.) I found the airlift's assessment seventy years later in a book by Richard Reeves titled Daring Young Men. He wrote: "The total number of flights into Berlin was recorded (by the US Air Force) as 277,569 — 189,963 by the Americans,

and 87,606 aircraft chartered by the British government." The tonnage figures: "2 325,809 tons, 1,783,573 by the (US) Air Force and 542,236 tons by



the Royal Air Forces of Britain, Australia and New Zeeland." They used various aircraft including the C-47 they called *the Dakota*. The C-47 brought in big loads, but the larger capacity of the C-54 made it the prominent carrier. The C-74, with even larger capacity, was used to bring bulky items across the Atlantic. We were giving the soviet dictator Stalin a big Cold War loss. That dictator had murdered, by many accounts, a million Ukrainians in the 1930s through forced starvation.



Now, in December 1948, my transfer to Selfridge suddenly could easily happen because 8th Weather was renamed (providential?) as 12th Weather. The 12th was the very squadron Selfridge's Base Weather itself was in. **TLC**

JANUARY IN HISTORY

January 1

New Year's Day - The most celebrated holiday around the world.

January 1, 1502 - Portuguese explorers landed at Guanabara Bay on the coast of South America and named it Rio de Janeiro (River of January). Rio de Janeiro is currently Brazil's second largest city.

January 1, 1660 - Samuel Pepys began his famous diary in which he chronicled life in London including the Great Plague of 1664-65 and the Great Fire of 1666.

January 1, 1776 - During the American Revolution, George Washington unveiled the Grand Union Flag, the first national flag in America.

January 1, 1801 - Ireland was added to Great Britain by an Act of Union thus creating the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

January 1, 1863 - The Emancipation Proclamation by President Abraham Lincoln freed the slaves in the states rebelling against the Union.

January 1, 1877 - Queen Victoria was proclaimed Empress of India.

January 1, 1892 - Ellis Island in New York Harbor opened. Over 20 million new arrivals to America were processed until its closing in 1954.

January 1, 1901 - The Commonwealth of Australia was founded as six former British colonies became six states with Edmund Barton as the first prime minister.

January 1, 1915 - During World War I, the British Battleship Formidable was hit by a torpedo in the English Channel, killing 547 crewmen.

January 1, 1942 - Twenty six countries signed the *Declaration of the United Nations*, in Washington, D.C., reaffirming their opposition to the Axis powers and confirming that no single nation would make a separate peace.

January 1, 1958 - The EEC (European Economic Community) known as the Common Market was formed by Belgium, France, West Germany, Italy, Luxembourg and The Netherlands in order to remove trade barriers and coordinate trade policies.

January 1, 1959 - Fidel Castro seized power in Cuba after leading a revolution that drove out Dictator Fulgencio Batista. Castro then established a Communist dictatorship.

January 1, 1973 - Britain, Ireland and Denmark became members of the Common Market (EEC).

January 1, 1975 - During the Watergate scandal, former top aides to President Nixon including former Attorney General John Mitchell, Domestic Affairs Advisor John Ehrlichman and Chief of Staff H.R. Haldeman, were found guilty of obstruction of justice.

January 1, 1979 - China and the U.S. established diplomatic relations, 30 years after the foundation of the People's Republic.

January 1, 1993 - Czechoslovakia broke into separate Czech and Slovak republics.

January 1, 1999 - Eleven European nations began using a new single European currency, the Euro, for electronic financial and business transactions. Participating countries included; Austria, Belgium, Finland, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Portugal and Spain.

Birthday - American Patriot Paul Revere (1735-1818) was born in Boston, Massachusetts. Best known for his ride on the night of April 18, 1775, warning Americans of British plans to raid Lexington and Concord.

Birthday - Betsy Ross (1752-1836) was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She was a seamstress credited with helping to originate and sew the Stars and Stripes flag of America in 1776.

January 2, 1905 - The Russians surrendered to the Japanese after the Battle of Port Arthur during the Russian-Japanese War. A peace conference was later held in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, with President Theodore Roosevelt serving as a mediator. In September of 1905, the Russians agreed to the Treaty of Portsmouth yielding Port Arthur and the Liaodong Peninsula to Japan. Russia also agreed to evacuate Manchuria and recognize Japan's interests in Korea.

January 2, 1942 - During World War II in the Pacific, the Japanese captured the Philippines capital of Manila and the nearby air base at Cavite.

January 2, 1960 - In Washington, D.C., Senator John F. Kennedy announced his intention to seek the Democratic presidential nomination.

January 3

January 3, 1777 - During the American Revolution, General George Washington defeated the British at Princeton and drove them back toward New Brunswick. Washington then established winter quarters at Morristown, New Jersey. During the long harsh winter, Washington's army shrank to about a thousand men as enlistments expired and deserters fled.

January 3, 1924 - British Egyptologist Howard Carter found the sarcophagus of Tutankhamen in the Valley of the Kings near Luxor after several years of searching.

January 3, 1946 - An Englishman known during World War II as "Lord Haw Haw" (William Joyce) was hanged for treason in London. Joyce had broadcast Nazi propaganda via radio from Germany to Britain during the war.

January 3, 1959 - Alaska was admitted as the 49th U.S. state with a land mass almost one-fifth the size of the lower 48 states together.






2023-2024 CHAPTER ACTION PLAN MID-SEASONAL UPDATE REPORT











SG-1: Consistently develop and deliver attractive, and high-impact community outreach programs and activities. Our Chapter continues to successfully adapt and intergrate MOWW programs and activities to attract veterans who will donate their time, talents, and efforts towards improving the well-being of our Youth, Community, and Nation-centric collaborative projects, scheduled VSO community hosted activities, and scheduled MOWW signature events. Thus far this OY our Chapter has hosted two Massing of the Colors, supported three other fellow chapter such events, and tracked the increase in fellow veteran outreach involvement in our major collaborative meeting forums and scheduled events. Examples include our chapter attending and actively joining local VSO programmed planning meetings, renewal of the local City of Tucson Veterans Affairs Mayor's Council, and supporting as many fellow VSO meetings and scheduled events as our activity calendar will allow. This Chapter continued effort has already yielded two newly recruited Chapter fellow companions and identified several additional leads for follow-up during the remainder of this OY.

SG-2: Expand our impact through alliances and strategic partnerships with organizations that align with our mission. Our Chapter continues to local VSO community alliances and partnerships and also in identifying new potential leads with both local, state and national like-minded veteran and civic organizations. The continued development and implement of already tested community engagement processes are pivotal for identifying and vetting potential alliances and strategic partners for continued refinement. Our Chapter Recognition Program emphasizes identifying and acknowledging some of our more involved collaborative partnerships such as the local Warranmt Officers Association, Knights of Columbus, local township Mayor's office staff, and contributing Unified School District leadership - ensuring our annual Massing of the Colors event a success each year.

SG-3: Increase visibility of the Order at the national and local community levels through focused communication, marketing strategies, and local community engagement. While our Chapter Marketing and Publicity Program is still growing, our Chapter has managed maximizing those legacy programs already in place - to help promote the Order during major signature events and activities and laying the foundational groundwork from which to implement a more comprehensive national MOWW Communication and Marketing Strategy premise that includes use of technologically based platforms and mediums, as we continue to make our organization brand presence where we continuosly service local community end-users. An example of such efforts is laying the groundwork for MOWW brand projection through our annual Chapter Awards Support Program services in nearby Utah - where no MOWW Chapter operations exists.

SG-4: Annually grow engaged and sustainable MOWW membership. Our Chapter has not only successfully met (or exceeded) its stated annual recruitment goals in recent years but also established a functional recruitment pipeline, where new leads and prospects are constantly identified and pursued. The key to continued companion motivation, influence, and engaged Companions, to proactively attract new Companions, to the Order and their Chapter, is to constantly improve the single fellow companion personal experience - one that does not criticize varying degrees of volunteerism, as we will always be most grateful for any companion contribution regardless of how little it may seem. A key example of how we ensure this process is always applying the D² approach where we acknowledge that fellow companions will either contribute as "Doers" or "Donators." Both have a significant roll in our Chapter operational mission.

SG-5: Increase revenues ensuring adequate financial resources to fulfill the Order's mission. Understanding years ago that our Chapter needed to seek and identify its own autonomous "stand-alone" fundraising methodology, our Chapter partnered with the local Green Valley, AZ Country Fair White Elephant non-profit which provides adequate portional funding during the OY. Having a stand-alone funding source came in most handy through the years, as the more traditional MOWW P&M Dividend payout began to decrease.

SG-6: Increase the number of chapters and strengthen existing chapters. While our Chapter has continued to methodically grow each OY, our most notable success lies with our ability to continuously expand our expeditionary MOWW services which has enriched our regional outreach and MOWW branding presence through our HUB & SPOKE operational services model.



We thank fellow SCV Chapter companion and current Adjutant Officer Lt Col (RET) Marlon Ruiz, USAF for compiling and presenting our Mid-Year Chapter Activity Plan Update Report - which offers a timely administrative and operational management summary of how we are doing "thus far" halfway through our current 2022-2023 chapter activity season. Fellow companion Ruiz is currently serving his second term as an MOWW Vice Commander-in-Chief for the Order (with oversight responsibilities for the entire southwest geographical Region XIII and the mid-western geographical Region II area of responsibility) and previously served as our chapter commander for 12 years and we are thankful to have him continue to serve our local chapter as our current Adjutant and senior MOWW leadership advisor. Lt Col Ruiz is also serving as our Region XIII committee representative in the national Veterans Affairs Committee, along with his other MOWW higher headquarters corporate responsibilities and commitments.
