COMMANDER'S REPORT:

Hello everyone. Hope you all are enjoying the summer vacation recess. I want to take this opportunity to thank you all for a great previous operating year (OY) that just ended last week, with the close of the month of June. As our Chapter representative heads off to attend this year's national convention in Annapolis, MD., we hope he will bring back favorable news regarding this past OY's national awards standings. We are very excited to confirm all the wonderful work put in by you all and I hold high expectations that we will d great once again this year in the national standings. On 1 July we ushered in the new 2023-2024 OY and with that we are currently tending to both the last of our prior OY AZYLC summer program support commitment and also keeping up with our new OY reporting and administrative responsibilities. Our Adjutant will expand upon the upcoming Chapter meeting schedule for the current year and you can take a glimpse of our Chapter Action Plan goals for this year in this newsletter edition. Note that the MOWW stated strategic goals have changed somewhat and our primary focus for this year will be centered on sustaining and building upon our many partnerships and fellow veteran community associations. For now, please keep safe out there and in your travels, for soon we will all be back to our usual Chapter activities in due course.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Happy Summer everyone. Our current Chapter bank account balance is as follows; CHECKING Acct. 1216 - \$899.78USD and SAVINGS Acct. 3835 - \$12,447.18USD. The MOWW Annual Financial Review FM-21 OY audit was completed, and each account balance has been verified and reconciled. A copy of the FM-21 has been documented and placed into the Chapter historical financial records. The annual (TAX YEAR 2022) IRS Reporting and TG Certification was submitted and accepted online on 5 JULY 2023 and confirmation received by the MOWW Treasurer General (via reply email notification message) on 8 JULY 2023. Chapter annual dues to both Region XIII and the Department of AZ have been tabulated (as per the Chapter BYLAWS) and mailed out to the respective Treasurer Officers. This year's Chapter dues payments were as follows; regional dues (plus an additional H&S program payout (estimated by the R-13 treasurer Officer to come out to \$90.00USD per7 operational Chapters) totaled \$124.00USD, and the Department of AZ dues was tabulated at \$68.00USD (a total of 68 living Chapter members as of 30 JUNE at \$1.00USD each). The Chapter Budget and Finance Committee members will convene at the first scheduled 2023-2024 OY Chapter Staff meeting (via ZOOM) scheduled for SAT, 22 JULY at 11AM and review/approve the current proposed budget Chapter Budget recommendations for the current 2023-2024 OY. The current Chapter starting FUND balances (for the current OY) is as follows; ADMIN - \$500.00USD (GREEN), O&M -\$750.70 (YELLOW), and PE - total funds depleted (RED), except for the current funds allocated only for AZYLC activities which remains \$12,196.48USD (GREEN), until AZYLC 2023 expenses have been issued for payment and funds withdrawn in the coming months from the total current balance. The only current pending new Chapter financial business is the formal establishment of the Chapter stand-alone dedicated AZYLC Fund account with US Bank.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

Greetings to all and welcome back to our 2023-2024 OY Chapter activity season. Current Chapter activities include supporting the AZYLC 2023 summer program which kicked off the week of 10 through 14 JULY at the ASU West Campus, up in Glendale, AZ. Following that activity is the MOWW national convention, hosted this year at Annapolis, MD for the week of 1 through 6 AUGUST. All scheduled Chapter Staff (ZOOM only) and Regular Membership (HYBRID) meetings have already been posted on to the Region XIII website Calendar page at (www.MOWWSCV.com/Calendar). Our first Regular Membership traditional locale meeting at the Casa Del Rio Mexican Restaurant is already in the calendar and scheduled tentatively for SAT, 2 SEPTEMBER at 11:30AM until approximately 2:00PM. For the 2023-2024 OY, we will once again host 4 quarterly Chapter Staff meetings and 5 Regular Membership meetings; to also include hosting; 2 signature Massing of the Colors and Service of Remembrance MOWW events. The regional website Publications section has also been updated, to include the latest MOWW Officer Review national magazine issue online and fresh Gallery photos for everyone's viewing of covered events leading to the final weeks of the previous OY and soon to include added event photos (in both the R-13 website Gallery and Facebook social media platforms from this year's national convention. The Chapter BYLAWS are currently undergoing a revision and should be ready for review and approval by our first Chapter Regular Membership meeting in SEPTEMBER of the current OY. MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

Army and Air Force Meteorology Schools

Marie and I met as B-29 engine parts inspectors in a WWII Detroit war materials production plant. We married and with WWII still officially ongoing, I enlisted in the Army Air Corps. While I was in basic training at Keesler Field, Mississippi, Marie stayed with her parents in Michigan. After basic, I was sent to Chanute Field, Illinois, for Weather Observer School where I rented a room for us in the adjacent town of Rantoul. Immediately following that school, I was placed in the Weather Equipment Teletype Technician School. Its teletype mechanic phase was held at Scott Field, Illinois. There, I rented a room for us in Belleville.

It was then time for me to do weather work and I was sent to 8th Weather Squadron at Chicopee Falls, Westover Field, Massachusetts, where I edited weather reports sent to us by teletype which I further sent to other weather stations. An AACS (Army Airways Communication Service) sergeant actually did the sending by tapping the reports on a telegraph key.

Meanwhile, WWII was declared officially ended and Army Air Corps/ Air Force made a co-equal military branch, the USAF. As the end of 1947 approached, while in Michigan in a pre-Christmas furlough, I received quite a shock. A telegram arrived from home base, telling me to proceed to Chanute Field, Illinois, to attend

six-month-long Weather Forecaster School Class 01148. A stunning development, it was believed the Air Force's toughest school. Marie joined me after I, once again, rented a room in Rantoul. Though I hoped I might some day be sent to it, I had not requested that school. I believed I was too young; the forecasters I knew were much older. Rank-wise, the class ranged from corporal to top enlisted, master sergeant. There were many ex-flying officers. Class 01148 started out with 100 students. Only about 60 graduated. I was one of the 60 and soon came out on orders as a skilled forecaster (MOS 787), wetting my feet during the Berlin Airlift, forecasting for C-54s, four-propellered planes that carried vitally needed food and other supplies on long flights over the Atlantic to the beleaguered residents of Berlin. More than 50 years later, long after I had graduated, good friend Tom McClung, highly respected in 8th Weather squadron's Operations, confided he had been selected for the class, had believed it too tough, and had declined attendance. I was his alternate. That school had lasting Marie and I would internalize consequences. meteorology. After my military and civilian retirements, I kept a record of beginning and ending of precipitation. My last military jobs were in the Vietnam War in artillery, severely deteriorating my hearing. So, if there was thunder, which I did not hear, Marie would tell me to expect the beginning of rain.

JULY IN HISTORY

July 1

- July 1st Canada Day, a national holiday in Canada, formerly known as Dominion Day, commemorating the confederation of Upper and Lower Canada and some of the Maritime Provinces into the Dominion of Canada on July 1, 1867.
- **July 1, 1862** President <u>Abraham Lincoln</u> signed the first income tax bill, levying a 3% income tax on annual incomes of \$600-\$10,000 and a 5% tax on incomes over \$10,000. Also on this day, the Bureau of Internal Revenue was established by an Act of Congress.
- July 1, 1863 Beginning of the Battle of Gettysburg during the American Civil War.
- **July 1, 1893** President Grover Cleveland underwent secret cancer surgery aboard a yacht owned by his friend, Commodore E.C. Benedict. The surgery was performed on a cancerous growth in his mouth. The entire left side of his jaw was removed along with a small portion of his soft palate. A second, smaller operation was performed on July 17th. Cleveland was then fitted with a rubber prosthesis which he wore until his death in 1908. The secrecy was intended to prevent panic among the public during the economic depression of 1893.

July 2

- July 2, 1776 The Continental Congress in Philadelphia adopted the following resolution, originally introduced on June 7, by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia: "Resolved, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved. That it is expedient forthwith to take the most effectual measures for forming foreign Alliances. That a plan of confederation be prepared and transmitted to the respective Colonies for their consideration and approbation."
- July 2, 1788 Congress announced the <u>United States Constitution</u> had been ratified by the required nine states and that a committee had been appointed to make preparations for the new American government.
- July 2, 1881 President James A. Garfield was shot and mortally wounded as he entered a railway station in Washington, D.C. He died on September 19th.
- July 2, 1917 A race riot occurred in St. Louis, Missouri, resulting in an estimated 75 African Americans killed and hundreds injured. To protest the violence against blacks, <u>W.E.B. DuBois</u> and James Weldon Johnson later led a silent march down Fifth Avenue in New York.
- July 2, 1964 President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1964, prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race in public accommodations, publicly owned or operated facilities, employment and union membership and in voter registration. The Act allowed for cutoff of Federal funds in places where discrimination remained.
- **Birthday** The first African American on the U.S. Supreme Court, Thurgood Marshall (1908-1993) was born in Baltimore, Maryland. Nominated by President Johnson, he began his 24-year career on the High Court in 1967.

July 3

- July 3, 1775 During the American Revolution, George Washington took command of the Continental Army at Cambridge, Massachusetts.
- July 3, 1976 The raid on Entebbe airport in Uganda occurred as an Israeli commando unit rescued 103 hostages on a hijacked Air France airliner. The jet had been en route from Tel Aviv to Paris when it was hijacked by pro-Palestinian guerrillas. Three hostages, seven hijackers and twenty Ugandan soldiers were killed during the rescue.
- July 3, 1988 Iran Air Flight 655 was destroyed while flying over the Persian Gulf after the U.S. Navy Warship *Vincennes* fired two surface-to-air missiles, killing all 290 passengers aboard. A subsequent U.S. military inquiry cited stress related human failure for the mistaken identification of the civilian airbus as an enemy F-14 fighter jet.

July 4

- July 4, 1776 The Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress.
- July 4, 1863- Vicksburg, the last Confederate stronghold on the Mississippi River, surrendered to General Grant and the Army of the West after a six week siege. With the Union in control of the Mississippi, the Confederacy was effectively split in two, cut off from its western allies.
- **July 4, 1882** The "Last Great Buffalo Hunt" began on Indian reservation lands near Hettinger, North Dakota as 2,000 Teton Sioux Indians in full hunting regalia killed about 5,000 buffalo. By this time, most of the estimated 60-75 million buffalo in America had been killed by white hunters who usually took the hides and left the meat to rot. By 1883, the last of the free-ranging buffalo were gone.
- **Birthday** Novelist and short-story writer <u>Nathaniel Hawthorne</u> (1804-1864) was born in Salem, Massachusetts. His works included; *The Scarlet Letter, The House of the Seven Gables* and *The Blithedale Romance*.
- **Birthday** Song writer Stephen Foster (1826-1864) was born in Lawrenceville, Pennsylvania. Among his nearly 200 songs were; *Oh! Susanna*, *Camptown Races, Swanee River, Jeanie with the Light Brown Hair*, and *Beautiful Dreamer*. He died in poverty at Bellevue Hospital in New York.
