COMMANDER'S REPORT:

Greetings once again to all our fellow companions, fellow veteran service organization partners and supportive community friends and family. As we continue to tie up any end-of-operating year loose ends, by way of reports and national award packages due to MOWW HQ by 1 JUNE 2023, I want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank everyone for the great year, as your chapter commander. As you will read in our end-of-year Chapter Action Plan final summary recap under our Featured MOWW Report segment in this edition, we have once again performed admirably and met all our stated 2022-2023 operating year (OY) goals. Most notably, is our sterling achievement in chapter recruitment and quick adaptation from a small chapter to a current medium chapter operation - with all the challenges that implies. Despite starting off the OY behind the power curb in recruitment and having to redesign a large part of our operational planning efforts, we still managed to progress smartly and catch up (and even surpass) achievements throughout the rest of the OY towards a very successful conclusion - as we head to the national convention in AUG 2023 in Annapolis, MD. I also want to personally commend all the personal efforts from those fellow companions who have participated in our activities and events throughout the year and for becoming more pronounced stakeholders in our chapter's continued success story this year.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

As of this report date our chapter has \$700.86 USDs in checking, and \$12,746.97 USDs in savings. With all expenses accounted for and reconciled, except for the upcoming AZYLC summer program sponsorship payout of 12 student delegates which are to be funded from the savings account, our chapter will end the current operating year in the GREEN. Chapter expenditures will begin once again in the new OY with our Country Fair White Elephant grant-writing campaign in September 2023 and continued efforts to increase our total chapter perpetual membership transitions from their current regular membership status. To date, we already have one fellow companion membership that will be transtioing from regular to perpetual in the next few months and with the increase of our chapter membership numbers hope to increase the P&M Dividend payout consideration for next year. efforts to the Green Valley The only unresolved pending financial business is the establishment of the Vantage West Credit Union AZYLC Fund Account which has been placed on hold pending the health recovery of key fellow companions recovering from surgical procedures current and unable to be physically present at the required banking institution meeting to formally establish the account in question. Given the current situation, we will pick up this old business during the upcoming new 2023-2024 OY season activity due to begin on 1 July 2023.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

As we rapidly approach another end to our chapter operational year (OY) I am very happy to report that our chapter has performed very well this OY on all fronts, to include overcoming some potential setbacks initially with recruiting and our augmented administrative challenges converting over to our current medium chapter operations. Having achieved our stated 4% net recruitment increase growth goals, we hope that between accomplishing that milestone and also taking on the hosting of a second annual Massing of the Colors & Service of Remembrance signature event (thus far the only MOWW chapter in recent history to accomplish this feet in the entire organization) that these accomplishments will be enough to push us to the head of the pack when considering our chapter for the prestigious GAS Pershing Chapter of the Year honors again this year. WE have also submitted a total of six [6] national award packages for consideration this year and an overall chapter award submission presence of seven [7] toal national award considerations, if you include our running once again for Chapter Newsletter Award consideration. As already shared in previous reports, I am most proud of the many chapter achievement milestones attempted and accomplished this year. In essence, the more our chapter was challenged, the more opportunities to excel were presented and achieved. Quickly recapping our noteworthy OY milestones started with successfully integrating a total of seventeen [17] former chapter fellow companions into our chapter activities and programs, taking on an additional Massing of the Colors & Service of Remembrance signature event and executing it in record planning time months before we would usually have to do so, and diligently keep abreast of our chapter recruitment challenges, resulting in overcoming a two fellow companion loss with a five [2] new recruited fellow companion effort that cancelled out the two losses and also guaranteed that we would meet our designated 4%net increase for the OY. Hat's off to every fellow companion who has contributed to all of our activities and event support efforts. I look forward to working with you all in the coming OY. For now please keep safe during the summer recess months and travel plans. God bless you all.


VSO-5 ALOV Post 132 Monthly MTG - MAY 2023

World War One Stories


On this Sunday evening in 1938, the wind blew at about 20 mph and Mr. and Mrs. Ben Burrows Graham Paige pulled into our farm driveway. They came to listen to the radio, the only one for miles around in rural Michigan. On If the wind was blowing, the propeller attached to the Windcharger Dad had installed on the highest peak of our two-story farmhouse roof would have charged the battery that powered our radio and the Burrows were sure to visit.

I was then 10 and liked to hear my father's friends speak about their service in World War One. They would begin to talk about the war and then quickly change the subject. From one of them, a first generation Ukrainian American, I asked, "What happened to you in the war?" He only went so far as to show bullet scars on his legs before he too changed the subject. Ben Burrows, of second-generation German extraction, would tell a war story and to our parents' relief, would omit the war's horrific events when talking to kids.

On this windy day, the battery was charged; and the Burrows, second generation German Americans, had come to listen to a favorite program, "The Hermit's Cave." But it wouldn't be aired until 10 p. m. It was then only about 7 p.m. How was one to keep the kids busy till 10 o'clock? No problem. Ben would tailor his story to a kids' audience.

While standing in a trench, he said, he would lay his Enfield rifle atop the sand bags and close his eyes as he pulled the trigger, explaining he didn't want to see the German he shot because it could be a relative. On another occasion, he was alone in a forested area with American lines behind him when the tempting aroma of fresh baked bread drew him to a dugout. It was a German army bakery, and behind Ben's pointed rifle, the bakers overloaded him with loaves of freshly baked bread, so many he had to stuff them under his shirt to carry them. With as many loaves as he could take, he walked a safe distance away, found a bed of soft leaves to lay on, gorged on warm fresh bread and covered himself with leaves to hide from German patrols. He soon fell asleep and was awakened the next morning by our troops who had advanced into that area.

The Hermit's Cave came on as Ben finished that story and we listened to it, a ghost story with eerie sound effects: rattling chains, whistling winds and other scary sounds. As it ended I was afraid the Burrows would be too scared to walk past our tire swing. It hung by chains off a limb of our big maple tree and the chains were rattling in the wind. But with steeled nerves they



soldiered on past the swing, got into their car. and returned safely to their home. Jumping ahead about 50 years,

one day a sergeant and I were dropped from a Huey, not far from unfriendlies in an old rice field, the pilots saying they had to suddenly extract troopers from an LZ. Hours dragged by and the thought did arise that they might be shot down. Looking around, I thought of how Ben would have handle this. But there were no trees, no leaves and no enticing aroma of baking bread.

JUNE IN HISTORY

June 1

Birthday - Founder of Utah and patriarch of the Mormon church Brigham Young (1801-1877) was born in Whittingham, Vermont. Called the "American Moses," he led thousands of religious followers <u>across the wilderness</u> to <u>settle</u> over 300 towns in the West, including Salt Lake City, Utah.

Birthday - Marilyn Monroe (1926-1962) was born in Los Angeles (as Norma Jean Mortensen). Following an unstable childhood spent in foster homes and orphanages, she landed a job as a photographer's model which led to a movie career. She later married baseball legend Joe DiMaggio. Beneath her glamorous movie star looks she was fragile and insecure and eventually succumbed to the pressures of Hollywood life. She died in Los Angeles from an overdose of sleeping pills on August 5, 1962. Best known for *Gentlemen Prefer Blondes* (1953), *The Seven Year Itch* (1955), *Bus Stop* (1956), *Some Like It Hot* (1959), and *The Misfits* (1961).

June 2

Birthday - Marquis de Sade (1740-1814) was born in Paris. He was a military leader, governor-general, and author, whose acts of extreme cruelty and violence resulted in the term *sadism* being created from his name to describe gratification in inflicting pain.

June 3

June 3, 1937 - The Duke of Windsor married Wallis Warfield Simpson in Monts, France. As King Edward VIII, he had <u>abdicated the Brit-ish throne</u> in December of 1936 amid tremendous controversy to marry Simpson, an American who had been divorced. Following the wedding, the couple lived in France and had minimal contact with the British Royal family. The Duke died in Paris on May 28, 1972, and was buried near Windsor Castle in England.

June 3, 1972 - Sally Jan Priesand was ordained a rabbi thus becoming the first woman rabbi in the U.S. She then became an assistant rabbi at the Stephen Wise Free Synagogue in New York City.

June 3, 1989 - Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, leader of the Islamic Revolution in Iran, died. On February 1, 1979, after 15 years in exile, he had staged a triumphant return to Iran which led to the downfall of the Shah. Khomeini then reorganized the government on Islamic principles. On November 11, 1979, a group of students loyal to Khomeini seized 66 hostages in the American Embassy in Teheran after the former Shah had entered the U.S. for medical treatment. Thus began an international political crisis lasting until January 20, 1981, when they were released.

Birthday - Confederate president <u>Jefferson Davis</u> (1808-1889) was born at Todd County, Kentucky. After the Southern states formed the Confederacy in 1861, he hoped to be named commander of the Confederate military forces but was instead chosen to be president, serving until 1865. Following the <u>Civil War</u>, he was imprisoned but never brought to trial. He died at age 81 in New Orleans.

June 4

June 4, 1944 - During <u>World War II in Europe</u>, Rome was liberated by the U.S. 5th Army, led by General Mark Clark. Rome had been declared an open city by German Field Marshal Albert Kesselring amid Allied concerns the Germans might stage a Stalingrad-style defense that would devastate the historic 'Eternal' city.

June 4, 1972 - An express train packed with more than 600 people rammed into a stalled train at full speed in the main station of Jessore, Bangladesh, killing 76 and injuring over 500 persons.

June 4, 1989 - The Chinese government ordered its troops to open fire on unarmed protesters in Tiananmen Square in Beijing. The protest had started on April 16 as about 1,000 students marched to mourn the death of Hu Yaobang, a pro-reform leader within the Chinese government. Despite government warnings, pro-reform and pro-democracy demonstrations continued for a month drawing ever-larger crowds of young people, eventually totaling over a million persons. On May 13, three thousand students began an eight-day hunger strike. The government imposed martial law on May 20 and brought in troops. On June 2, in their first clash with the People's Army, demonstrators turned back an advance of unarmed troops. However, in the pre-dawn hours of June 4, the People's Army, using tanks, machine-guns, clubs and tear gas, opened fire on the unarmed protesters. Armored personnel carriers then rolled into the square crushing students still sleeping in their tents. The Chinese government later claimed only 300 died in the attack. U.S. estimates put the toll at over 3,000. Following the massacre, over 1,600 demonstrators were rounded up and jailed, with 27 being executed.





OVERVIEW: Our chapter once again has achieved 100% of its stated 2022-2023 OY Chapter Action Plan (CAP) goals. In spite of having to revamp its meeting schedule and day-to-day operations to help welcome and accommodate 17 newly transitioning fellow companions from a neighboring chapter closure, having to cope with the passing of two fellow companions and offsetting their impact by recruiting 5 new fellow companions to meet its stated 4% net increase chapter growth quota, and literally doubling its annual Massing of the Colors & Service of Remembrance signature event commitment (adding a second such event) our chapter nonetheless persevered and will proudly usher in another very competitive national awards season - submitting 6 national program award packages and is expected to compete very well for the coveted GAS Pershing Chapter of the Year award honors. Refer to first and second graphics for further details.

SG-1 Recruit, Convene & Involve Companions: Our chapter began the current 2022-2023 OY making the leap from a small chapter into a medium category chapter over night - due to assumption of over two-hundred plus fellow companions from the former Catalina Mountains (CM) Chapter 212 in east Tucson. As the third graphics depicts, this sudden increase to our chapter roster added a massive administrative load to our operational books which continues to this day - as we continue to vet former CM Chapter companions who may still reside in the local Tucson area and who will be notified with time about the continued nature of our MOWW activities under our chapter management. Regardless, of the added burden, our chapter was able to withstand and absorb these and other challenges and did not hamper our ability to achieve all of our desired CAP goals. In summary our SG-1 goals were accomplished with the recruitment of 5 new fellow companions, 11 transitioning fellow companions from the former CM Chapter e-establishing contact and notifying them of our continued MOWW community outreach mission in southern Arizona.

SG-2 Provide Companion Leadership Training: With the addition of 17 transitioning new companions and the successful recruitment of 5 more this OY, our chapter has a renewed interest and motivation to seize upon our SG-2 companion leadership training efforts and opportunities. Our 2023-2024 OY CAP will address this renewed opportunity to bring on board and provide every fellow companion a meaningful stakeholder role in our chapter's success moving forward for the upcoming new OY.

SG-3 Mentorship & Develop Companions: Likewise is the case, from the scenario presented in the previous SG-2 performance summary for our SG-3 companion mentorship and development opportunities in the upcoming 2023-2024 OY. As our chapter fellow companion numbers continue to increase, so will our capabilities - as was demonstrated during our recent annual ROTC-JROTC award ceremony presenters - where for the first time ever our chapter had 5 fellow companions volunteer to serve as award medal package presenters. We are also truly blessed to have gained a chapter chaplain and monthly newsletter article author, who both have elevated our monthly publication to new heights.

<u>SG-4</u> Conduct Chapter Advertising & Publicity: Our chapter SG-4 efforts continue unimpeded by occasional operational challenges. The key to our successes in accomplishing our stated goals is due to our heavy veteran services organization (VSO) and robust civic group (CG) sustained and growing partnerships - which have yielded opportunities in all other chapter outreach and engagement opportunities.

SG-5 Expand & Improve Chapter Outreach Programs: Gains in this SG performance dovetail nicely with our previous SG-4 efforts and planning acumen. Again the corner stone for our continued successes are due to our very strong community partnership practices.

SG-6 Recognize Chapter & Companion Excellence: Our chapter now hosts two Massing of the Colors & Service of Remembrance (MOC) in a single OY. Even though our chapter had to consider foregoing some scheduled commitments supported in past Oys (manly due to the addition of several commitments (scheduled for the same day and in some instances for the same event time) we were able to keep a constant community outreach presence and routine service project schedule this year. The last graphics shows our scheduled, completed and cancelled outreach commitment trends for the current 2022-2023 OY.
