#### COMMANDER'S REPORT:

As another MOWW operating years comes to a close on 30 JUNE, I wanted to take a moment to thanks all those fellow companions throughout the year that have helped place our chapter among the top local community engagement, support services contributor, and national award recipient contenders again this year. Our fourth quarter activities calendar and commitments were the highest on record, having met increasing JROTC-ROTC program MOWW awards presentation event support and satisfied end-user supported academic school services. It was once an extraordinary chapter recruitment year, having our chapter pick up four new chapter memberships in just a short one month and a half period - placing our chapter into the 100% medium chapter recruitment goal accomplishment listing at our national headquarters once again. Our chapter also hosted two successful MOWW signature event Massing of the Colors & Service of Remembrance Ceremonies during the first and second halves of the current ending 2023-2024 operating year and also supporting four additional Region XIII sister such events throughout the states of Arizona and Texas. As current operations begin whining down, our chapter also has taken on the added administrative and operational challenge of overseeing the Arizona Youth Leadership, Inc. (AZYL, Inc.) Board of Directors (IRS 501c3) formerly under the direction of the Phoenix Chapter in central Arizona. The AZYL, Inc also has a pivotal role in the planning and execution each year of the Arizona Youth Leadership Conference (AZYLC) summer program, scheduled to be launched on the first week of JULY (8 to 12 JULY) - during the early opening days of the commencement of the MOWW 2024-2025 operating year and our chapter will once again be sponsoring a total of 12 student delegates to this event hosted at the Phoenix Papago Park Military Reservation training site. Much more has been accomplished by our chapter this year and will be reported in our end-of-year Chapter Actin Plan summary report in our next newsletter by our Adjutant.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT:

As of the publishing of this chapter financial report, the current CHASE Bank Chapter Business accounts are as follows; Checking: \$1,000.00 USDs and Savings: \$1,369.96 USDs respectively. The SCV Chapter US Bank Account stand-alone AZYLC Fund account continues to steadily grow at a very slow pace, considering that no further chapter donations have been received to help boost our current balance of \$5,059.64 USDs, as of the end of MAY 2024. All account balance information has been reconciled and annotated. The only pending chapter expenditure for the remaining 2023-2024 operating year period (ending on 30 JUNE) is the anticipated associated sponsorship cost of supporting 12 student delegates, who have been identified and screened to attend AZYLC 2024 this calendar year (which any travel, lodging, meal services, and ancillary program associated expenditures during the 4-night / 5-day youth mentorship and leadership program offering in central Arizona. Considering that the established US Bank AZYLC Fund account has not received any donation contributions this operating year, we anticipate that our chapter will need to tap into our current chapter CHASE Bank business account funding to help offset any incurred AZYLC 2024 program services expenditures exceeding the current US Bank balance on file.

#### ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

As reported by our chapter commander, our chapter has met or exceeded its stated Chapter Action Plan goals for the 2023-2024 operating year. As a result, our chapter will be attempting to maximize its annual national awards submissions year - which is an undeclared pre-requisite towards faring well in submitting our chapter as a worthy contender once again for medium chapter category General of the Armies Chapter of the Year Award top honors. As mentioned by our commander, a more comprehensive report will be published in our first 2024-2025 operating year chapter newsletter JUNE-JULY 2024 edition. Our last chapter regular membership meeting is scheduled for the first Saturday in JUNE (SAT, 1 JUNE 2024 @ 12PM) at our usual Casa Del Rio Mexican Restaurant location in east Tucson. We also will be presenting and voting in our new chapter leadership slate of officers for the incoming 2024-2025 operating year. We appreciate fellow companions LTC (ret) Ron St. Clair, USA (current Commander), Lt Col (ret) Marlon Ruiz, USAF (current Adjutant), and HPM Adriana Ruiz (current Treasurer) for all stepping up once again to service another operating year in their current capacities. I also want to remind every companion that registration for the MOWW national convention in King of Prussia, PA is still open. The most recent Officer Review Magazine (MAY-JUNE 2024 edition) provides of summary of all the proposed Constitution & Bylaws Amendments to be discussed and voted on during the convention [pages 8 & 9], and for those who plan on attending the convention this year, the 2024 MOWW National Convention event itinerary and tours to be offered can be found as well [pages 16 & 17]. For those fellow chapter companions who will attend and also service as chapter voting delegate representative, a quick reminder that all voting delegates must hand carry a completed and chapter commander signed FM-22 [MOWW Convention Delegate Appointment] in order to receive the "DELEGATE" ribbon authorizing the attendee to participate in any MOWW business meeting secure voting area and activity participation. Lastly, the Region XIII Spring Conference will be held via online ZOOM video conference call session only this year on [FRI, 21 JUNE 2024 @ 10AM AZMST]. Al chapter fellow companions are invited to LOGIN. All regional chapters must participate and have their chapter leadership or designated appointed representative present to brief and share their end-of-year FM-27 [Chapter Activity Report] performance statistics for the closing operating year. We wish everyone a safe and pleasant summer vacation period and hope to see you all as we commence a new MOWW operating year starting on 1 JULY 2024.


R-13: MGM Chapter Monthly HYB MTG - MAY 2024

# Air Force Weathermen Discover the Jet Stream

On an otherwise normal day in 1949, a runner gave me the upper air sounding that our rawin section troops had just produced; and it came to my attention that Jet aircraft icing was just one of the unknowns we weathermen now faced as jets came upon the scene. I called the rawin section chief to ask they check their calculations. The winds seemed in error. They had found wind speeds approaching an almost incredible 200 mph at about 30,000 feet altitude. If correct, jets might fly into such winds at their usual flying altitude. The section chief said he had also doubted the winds, had rechecked the calculations, and insisted they were accurate. The winds were indeed nearly 200 mph. At this base, Selfridge Air Force Base in 1949, we had a rawin section in addition to a weather observing and forecasting section. On a 12-hour schedule that meshed with other radiosonde readings obtained from a multitude of worldwide sites, rawin section technicians inflated a large balloon, tied it with waxed string to a radiosonde, released it, and tracked it by means of a device named "SCR-658." It has been a very long time but in my memory the SCR-658 was a radio receiver composed of two antenna each of which made in a rectangular shape. Their design and size inevitably suggested the name "the bed springs" as the rawin guys called it. One of them sat on its metal seat such as could be seen on a farmer's hay mower or gang plow. By turning cranks, the technician kept

the antennae on radiosonde's signal viewed as green blips on an oscilloscope-like small screen. The advent in 1952 of the automatic-tracking

AN/GMD-1, its photo at right taken in Ted's 1966 Vietnam section, brought much joy to the technicians who had been sitting on cold metal seat



during rain, snow, or sleet storms. Forecasting friends had earlier suspected there were 200 mph



high-level winds. As he discussed in the January

Society, William J. Plumley, in WWII's 1945 a forecaster involved with forecasts for the bombing route to Japan, had then investigated 200 mph or more winds that B-29s had reported. (Ted's B-29 photo above was taken in Saudi Arabia in 1951.) Plumley's conclusion: "Previously unknown high winds over Japan did exist in the upper air...." Plumley had then served with Loren Crow a well-respected meteorologist with whom I had contacts while at the Climatic Center in D.C. in 1963. In 1949, more soundings made us believe there indeed were such winds. They would later get the name "jet stream." TLC

# **JUNE IN HISTORY**

#### June 1

**Birthday** - Founder of Utah and patriarch of the Mormon church Brigham Young (1801-1877) was born in Whittingham, Vermont. Called the "American Moses," he led thousands of religious followers <u>across the wilderness</u> to <u>settle</u> over 300 towns in the West, including Salt Lake City, Utah.

**Birthday** - Marilyn Monroe (1926-1962) was born in Los Angeles (as Norma Jean Mortensen). Following an unstable childhood spent in foster homes and orphanages, she landed a job as a photographer's model which led to a movie career. She later married baseball legend Joe DiMaggio. Beneath her glamorous movie star looks she was fragile and insecure and eventually succumbed to the pressures of Hollywood life. She died in Los Angeles from an overdose of sleeping pills on August 5, 1962. Best known for *Gentlemen Prefer Blondes* (1953), *The Seven Year Itch* (1955), *Bus Stop* (1956), *Some Like It Hot* (1959), and *The Misfits* (1961).

#### June 2

**Birthday** - Marquis de Sade (1740-1814) was born in Paris. He was a military leader, governor-general, and author, whose acts of extreme cruelty and violence resulted in the term *sadism* being created from his name to describe gratification in inflicting pain.

# June 3

June 3, 1937 - The Duke of Windsor married Wallis Warfield Simpson in Monts, France. As King Edward VIII, he had <u>abdicated the British throne</u> in December of 1936 amid tremendous controversy to marry Simpson, an American who had been divorced. Following the wedding, the couple lived in France and had minimal contact with the British Royal family. The Duke died in Paris on May 28, 1972, and was buried near Windsor Castle in England.

June 3, 1972 - Sally Jan Priesand was ordained a rabbi thus becoming the first woman rabbi in the U.S. She then became an assistant rabbi at the Stephen Wise Free Synagogue in New York City.

June 3, 1989 - Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, leader of the Islamic Revolution in Iran, died. On February 1, 1979, after 15 years in exile, he had staged a triumphant return to Iran which led to the downfall of the Shah. Khomeini then reorganized the government on Islamic principles. On November 11, 1979, a group of students loyal to Khomeini seized 66 hostages in the American Embassy in Teheran after the former Shah had entered the U.S. for medical treatment. Thus began an international political crisis lasting until January 20, 1981, when they were released.

**Birthday** - Confederate president <u>Jefferson Davis</u> (1808-1889) was born at Todd County, Kentucky. After the Southern states formed the Confederacy in 1861, he hoped to be named commander of the Confederate military forces but was instead chosen to be president, serving until 1865. Following the <u>Civil War</u>, he was imprisoned but never brought to trial. He died at age 81 in New Orleans.

# June 4

June 4, 1944 - During World War II in Europe, Rome was liberated by the U.S. 5th Army, led by General Mark Clark. Rome had been declared an open city by German Field Marshal Albert Kesselring amid Allied concerns the Germans might stage a Stalingrad-style defense that would devastate the historic 'Eternal' city.

**June 4, 1972** - An express train packed with more than 600 people rammed into a stalled train at full speed in the main station of Jessore, Bangladesh, killing 76 and injuring over 500 persons.

June 4, 1989 - The Chinese government ordered its troops to open fire on unarmed protesters in Tiananmen Square in Beijing. The protest had started on April 16 as about 1,000 students marched to mourn the death of Hu Yaobang, a pro-reform leader within the Chinese government. Despite government warnings, pro-reform and pro-democracy demonstrations continued for a month drawing ever-larger crowds of young people, eventually totaling over a million persons. On May 13, three thousand students began an eight-day hunger strike. The government imposed martial law on May 20 and brought in troops. On June 2, in their first clash with the People's Army, demonstrators turned back an advance of unarmed troops. However, in the pre-dawn hours of June 4, the People's Army, using tanks, machine-guns, clubs and tear gas, opened fire on the unarmed protesters. Armored personnel carriers then rolled into the square crushing students still sleeping in their tents.
